There wasn't enough money in the Truman family to start young Truman to college in 1901 after he finished high school but he dreamed o. West Point and an Army career.
He succeeded in getting an alternate appointment to the military academy but failed on the physical examination. His eyes gave him trouble then as now possibly a throwback to the thousands of books he had devoured from the age of 13.
Truman joined the Missouri National Guard in 1905 when he was 21 years old. He was assigned to Battery B as a buck private, and for ten year Truman helped to organize the Second Missouri Field artillery, which became the 129th Field Artillery of the 35th Division when mobilized os the United States entry into the war.
Truman took officers training at Camp Doniphan and was gradu ated as a second lieutenant. In




