



Both of Truman's parents were born on farms in what is now the midtown residential district of Kansas City, John Anderson Truman in 1851 and Mary Ellen Young Truman on Nov. 25, 1852. After the Civil war border warfare that tore Jackson county to bits, the Youngs returned to the farm, buying the Truman farm of today in 1867.

Truman's parents took over management of this farm in 1904 with the two younger children, J. Vivien and Mary, and in 1906 Truman asked the older son, Harry S. to come to the farm and help him operate it. Truman resigned his \$100 a month bank clerkship to do it. to do it.

"It was on the farm that Harry got all his common sense; he didn't get it in town," his mother says

"He began to read when he was

today.

Truman's brother Vivien married and moved to another farm in 1911, and the senior Truman died in 1914. The farm had changed somewhat in appearance since it came into the family: the house had burned in 1892 and a cottage had been built. Today the old barn is the only remaining structure of earlier days.

Truman and his mother and sister operated the 600 acre tract from 1908 to April 1917, and it was then that Truman acquired his deep love for the soil. About 200 acres was in pasture and the rest under cultivation, much of it is corn. Truman took a tancy to Hampshire hogs, and raised them in large numbers. He also fed cattle by the thousand, marketing them in mearby Kansas City.

To Be Little White Heuse.
Truman came back to the farm after the First World war only briefly. He was mustered out in May, 1919, and maximed in June. His mother-in-law, Mrs. David W. Wallace, a widow, asked the Truman's to live with her in the big '4-room house that, her father had built during the Civil war. 


