In one of the shortest meetings on record, lasting but one hour, the Selectmen last night awarded the contract for the swimming pool and the bathhouse in Robertson Park in the rear of the Y. M. C. A. to the Alexander Jarvis Company for \$4,400. Construction on the pool is expected to begin within 10 days. In the absence of Chairman Harold M. Reed, who is ill, David Chambers was named presiding officer.

Only two bids were filed for the work, the second being submitted by the C. L. Hale Construction Company for \$4,681.60.

### 45 Taken Ill At Conference

Bellingham, Wash., May 4.—(AP)—Thirty-nine of an estimated 45 persons taken suddenly ill during a church conference yesterday afternoon still were in St. Luke's hospital late last night but hospital attendants had hope was believed in critical condition and all were resting easily.

### Weekly Bonus Plan Ordered

Middletown Concern Directed to Continue as In Past.

Washington, May 4.—(AP)—The Russell Manufacturing Company, Middletown, Conn., was directed by the War Labor board today to continue its guaranteed 10 percent bonus on a weekly basis, instead of quarterly.

The National board upheld an order of the Boston Regional board, which concluded the weekly bonus had become part of the wage structure because it had been paid that way since December, 1931.

The company contended the payments were only advances against a profit-sharing bonus according to the 1,200 workers each quarter. It maintained it did not guarantee indefinitely continued payment of the bonus regardless of the company's profit position, and that it now wished to return to the quarterly payment plan.

### Pay Breaches Bring Fines

Ten New England Concerns Violate Wage Stabilization Laws.

Boston, May 4.—(AP)—Ten New England firms have been found in violation of national wage stabilization laws and have been assessed a total of \$20,625.18, the tripartite enforcement division of the New England War Labor Board announced yesterday.

The board said the assessments are to be disregarded by the Internal Revenue bureau as allowable deductions in calculating the income taxes of the companies.

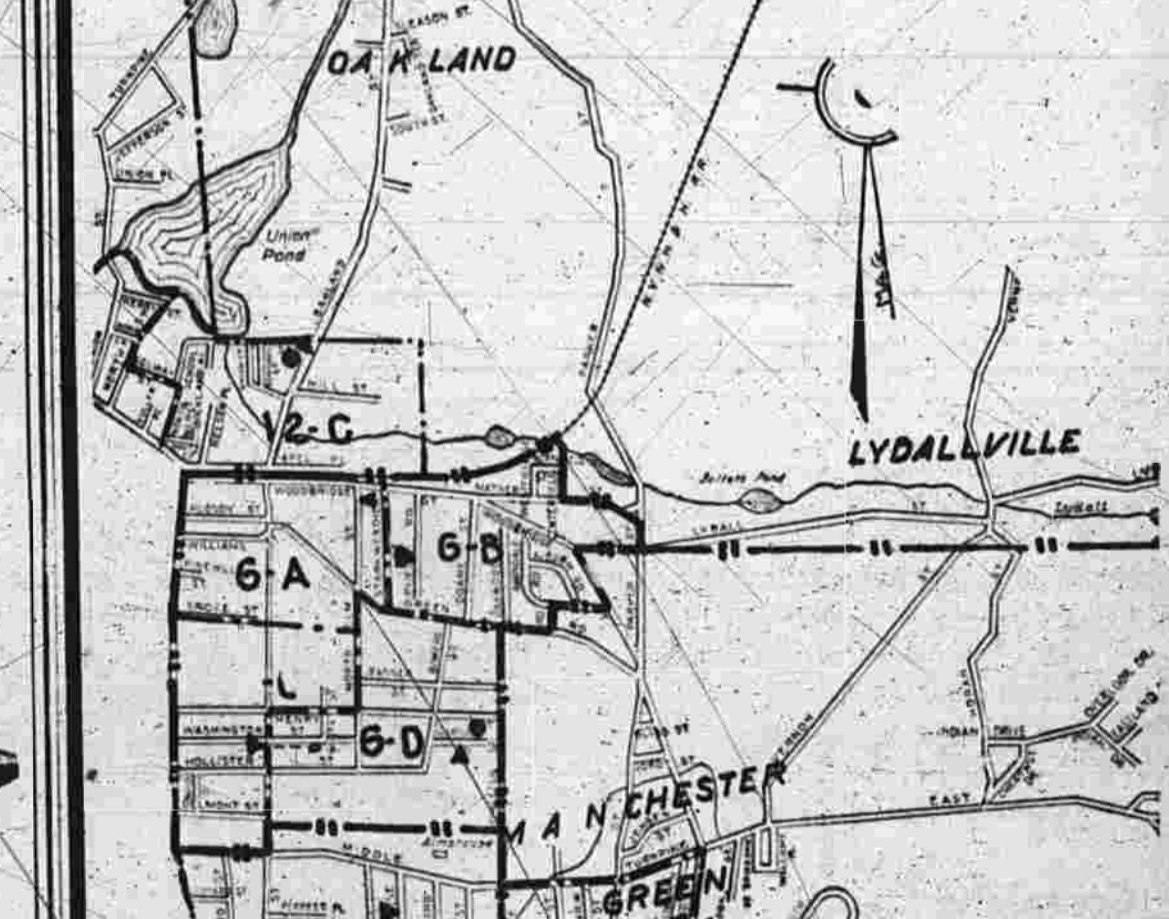

### Don't Expect Miracles To Follow Conference

International Organizational Will Not Be Cure-All for Human Problems.

By James Merton  
San Francisco, May 4.—(AP)—Don't expect miracles to come out of the United Nations conference.

The delegates of the 46 nations here are working to create an international organization or league, it won't be a cure-all for human problems.

The primary purpose of the league would be to:  
1. Prevent future wars.  
2. Enable the nations to work together on many problems, such as trading goods and services, for example.

3. Settle international disputes peacefully through a world court or joint action of the league members.

4. May Try to Widen Activities  
As the years pass the league may try to widen its activities so that the simple problem of living may be made easier.

For instance, an international health organization could help underdeveloped peoples develop better use of their food or make better use of their land.

5. This league believes in safeguarding human rights. It believes in freedom of the press, freedom of worship, justice for all.

All that sounds fine. But not every nation is apt to live up to that program.

For example, suppose that 10 years from now some nation begins a persecution of a minority group.

Would the league step in and say to that nation: "Cut it out. Give 'back' to those people the money and property and jobs you took away from them?"

That isn't likely. It's possible that a nation which was outrageous in its treatment of a minority group might be tossed out of the league.

That would have some effect in keeping nations from repeating the same mistakes. But maybe it wouldn't.

These are questions confronting delegates from 46 nations.

The hearing before the committee on Federal and intergovernmental relations, was on the proposal to memorialize Congress in persons in the eyes of the law.

Representatives of several women's organizations advanced the argument that adoption of the amendment would serve to legitimize discrimination against women.

The opposition, comprising organizations representing labor and some women's organizations, contended that it would not accomplish such a purpose and would lead to a "chaotic condition." Opinion seemed evenly divided with but two of the women present taking any part in the discussion.

Members of the committee questioned some of the witnesses as to whether approval of the measure would mean repeal of "protective" legislation favoring women.
