Rouge Plant Water Supply

Peak wartime production has created the biggest industrial plant in the world at the Rouge Motor Company.

More than 145 billion gallons of water was pumped from the Detroit River into the 125-acre plant in Dearborn last year.

This equals the combined volume of water contained annually by the cities of Detroit, San Francisco and Pittsburgh.

Approximately 358,000 gallons a minute is required to cool the plant turbo-generator and turbo-blower units in the Rouge No. 1 power house, largest industrial steam generating plant in the world.

In addition, enormous quantities are used to cool company blast furnaces and the hundreds of lesser furnaces, welding machines and other machines.

Excavating was done by the Shield method. Shirts were sunk midway of half the distance between the Detroit River intake and the Rouge plant power house.

The exterior of the tunnel, which was opened in May, 1931, is constructed of interlocking concrete blocks, each weighing 8,420 pounds. A total of 48,700 were used. The inside lining is cement.

Allow "Flexible" Adjustment. General tariff regulations allow a "flexible" 50 per cent adjustment on duties, either up or down. The current trade agreement, passed by another 50 per cent, permits another 50 per cent. The additional authority would be on top of that.

To illustrate, Senator Taft told the committee that Mexican beer, which once came in under a 14-cent tariff, would be important under a 12-cent tariff.

Senate hearings probably will continue another week. Finance Chairman George (D., Ga.) told reporters.

The committee hopes to dispose of the trade agreement proposal in time to resume by next Thursday, the question of repealing the Johnson act of 1934. This law forbids credit to any country which has defaulted on past debts.

Rockville Woman Receives Good News from War Department.

Rockville, June 1. (Special.) Mrs. Lottie Cratty of Cottage street received word from the War Department on Wednesday that her son, Pfc. Thomas W. Cratty, who was captured by the Germans on November 15, 1944, had been released. The telegram from the adjutant general also states that he was returned to military control on May 1945. Pfc. Cratty is the husband of Mrs. Eunice West Cratty of Spruce street.

Corporal Herbert W. Spiller of Union street who has recently returned as injured in action from Austria, has written his wife, Mrs. Arlene Spiller of Union street that he was a prisoner of war for about 24 hours. He was injured while riding in a jeep and was wounded three times in the arm and neck by shrapnel in his own country. His outfit ran into an ambush and all were taken prisoners for 24 hours being liberated by their own troops.

He had been received by the family of Lieutenant Robert Sherman, son of Mrs. Sarah Sherman of Tauntonville, that he had been liberated, May 9, 1945. Lieutenant Sherman was reported a prisoner of war. He enlisted on his 18th birthday on Dec. 10, 1939. He was a pilot of a Mustang fighter plane.

Canning Sugar Now Suspended

Boston, June 1.—(AP)—Temporary suspension of home canning sugar certificates to ease an "extremely tight" supply situation, was announced yesterday by the New England OPA.

The suspension probably will last two or three weeks, John W. Tarbell, regional food rationing officer, said.

"This is probably the first time New England has had real cause to worry," Tarbell said.

The food rationing officer said officials hoped the temporary suspension would assure equitable distribution of sugar over the entire canning period.

Chisling also would be prevented, he added, by a screening of applications already filed with local boards and a requirement that applicants specify the use to which the sugar will be put.

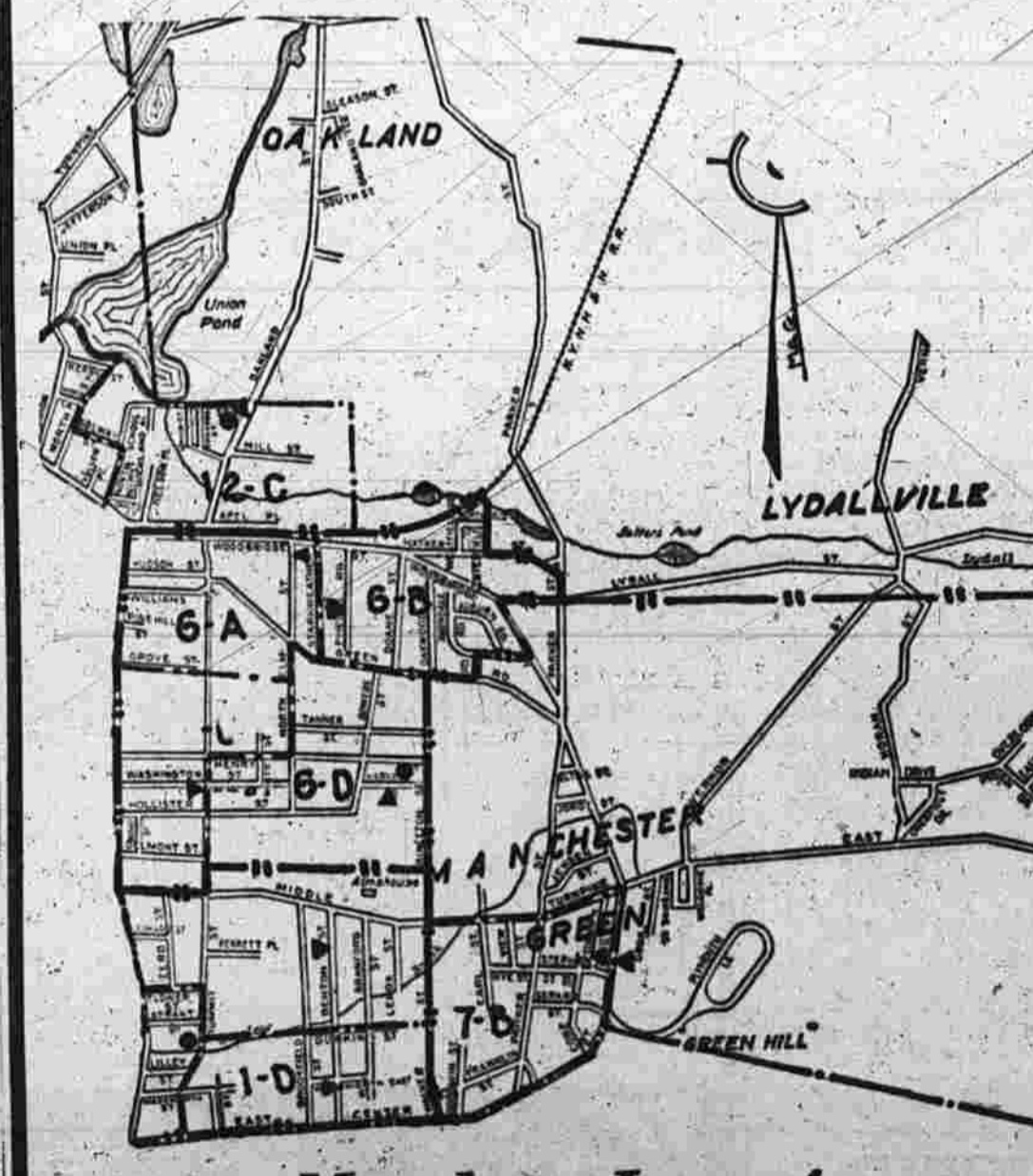

War Prisoner's Story Told to Herald Man

Visitor Here Describes Wild Scenes During Final Days of Conflict in Towns in Germany.

A thrilling account of his six months as a Nazi prisoner of war in a camp and wandering for a year through the entire principality of Pomerania, was given The Herald today by Private Bernard Giorgio, of Londonderry, N. Y., nephew of Anthony Giorgio, of 480 Main street, on a visit here. He was a member of the 5th Division, 3rd "Patton" Army.

Show Opens Today

Private Giorgio was captured by the Germans while on a reconnaissance patrol on the left flank of the city of Metz on Oct. 9, 1944. His unit was surrounded by a company of Nazi infantry and three tanks while in a building in the outskirts of the city, trying there to obtain military information.

The group of prisoners with which Private Giorgio was attached stayed two weeks at Landsberg in Stalingrad, and while there the local visitor lost a total of 25 pounds, due to the scarce rations. Later they were transferred to Stalag 2B in Pomerania.

Private Giorgio received his first Red Cross parcel, as did others of the group. The contents of these parcels, totaling about 11 pounds of assorted foods and other necessities, made life more bearable to them all. This was on Nov. 20, 1944, and the big drive had not yet begun over the Rhine.

The food at Landsberg was the worst the prisoners experienced. Private Giorgio said. One day they had a meal of beet tops soup mixed with a very poor substitute or "ersatz" dehydrated cabbage. That meal was to last that day.

Advices Fellow Prisoners: The prisoners suffered from diarrhoea at Landsberg and Private Giorgio, who had some experience as a student chemist, advised the prisoners not to eat a hot meal of soup and cabbage, but to eat a meal of potatoes, sugar or coffee. They made a drink of "ersatz" coffee from burned barley and a kind of mineral water.

Earlier, at Zwickbrucken, the German captors, after removing the officers, tried to have the enlisted men build machine gun emplacements and gun emplacements for them, but they refused. The Germans threatened to shoot them for their refusal, but many of the prisoners, longer in custody than Giorgio, refused to build them.

It seemed everything was done to them without reason to blow the Americans or to render them sick and feeble from long marches in inclement weather, but the good old Yankee ingenuity prevailed again and a remarkable story of survival under trying conditions was revealed.

Contrary to the accepted story of the treatment of Nazi prisoners, the Americans were able to buy cigarettes and soap to civilize the prisoners, to secure guns of various kinds, ammunition for them, and knives.

The local railway express office reports that 50 barrels of fish, sent from Hartford, arrived in Manchester yesterday for distribution to local merchants. This is the largest amount received in town to date and it serves as an indication that fish will be more plentiful to Manchester families.

The trains are all coming from the East and the soldiers are all veterans of campaigns against the Axis.

After a 60-day furlough Private Giorgio will go to a rest camp at Lake Placid, New York, for medical checking, recreation and probable discharge.

He said the gravity of the situation was "confirmed by the fact that all jails in the country are full," the overlocking.

It is confirmed also by the correspondent's admittedly incomplete file, which show that during the month of May alone, eight newspapers were closed and seven editors and other outstanding newspapermen arrested. Cortesi wrote.

Violations Of Commitments

"It is hardly necessary to point out that the above activities of the Argentine government and many others like them are direct violations of the commitments that Argentina assumed when she signed the final acts of Mexico City."

Cortesi said that "under the pretense that in wartime anyone who did not approve of the government was a traitor to his country, the government embarked on a campaign of intimidation by wholesale arrests of prominent citizens and severe measures against any newspaper that dared to raise its voice in protest. At the same time political censorship was reestablished in the vain hope that news of what was going on could be kept from the outside world."

Reports Dispatch Mangled

He said censorship had mangled one dispatch he sought to file Tuesday, dealing with a statement by the Argentine government that it had agreed to a general election, however, was left in abeyance.

Controls Campaign Funds

The decree, bringing Argentine political parties back to life and creating a new judicial branch, provides penalties for fraud in balloting, and forbids creation of groups of a military character within political parties.

"Censorship was reestablished by a decree dated April 28," Cortesi's dispatch said, and it quoted the decree as saying: "Telegrams are subject to retention, delay and total or partial suppression without notice to the interested parties. This ostensibly wartime measure," Cortesi said, "applied even to news not directly connected with the war."

"For some time correspondents were unaware that their dispatches had died in the censorship office," Cortesi said.
