Meat Distribution Plan Causes Riot

Havana, Cuba, June 6.—(AP)—One person was killed and several others were injured in fighting which broke out yesterday in front of the presidential palace after the government instituted a meat distribution plan.

A youth about 20 years old was killed when police, armed with tear gas weapons, attempted to break up the demonstration of approximately 30,000 persons.

After a morning distribution of meat by government-operated trucks under a plan to break up black market sales, some 2,000 meat dealers and their employees marched on the palace in protest. Then several thousand other persons attempted to break up the demonstration and fights broke out.

First Berlin Broadcast Since Pre Pearl Harbor

New York, June 6.—(AP)—For the first time since pre-Pearl Harbor days, a broadcast has been received from Berlin to this country. It was supplied by Roy Porter of NBC, selected as host broadcaster for the networks of the meeting of the Allied Control Commission in the German capital.

He didn't use the transmitters on the studios over which American radio men once reported under the watchfulness of the Nazis. He spoke from Templehof stadium on the outskirts of the city. The signals were originated by the Army Signal Corps short wave equipment installed in an American airplane, which was on the ground at the time. The relay was to Paris, then this country.

The last time broadcasts direct from Berlin had been relayed by the networks came nearly a month before Pearl Harbor, after which the Nazis began to clamp their ears. These were the morning of Nov. 10, 1941, when both NBC and CBS had brief pickings.

Stocks of clothing in the hands of retail distributors throughout the country are at the lowest point in history and this situation will be further aggravated by the necessity of having civilian goods ready for hundreds of thousands of returning veterans during the next few months, Frank Balkner of the C. E. House and Son firm here said yesterday. Clothing manufacturers are urging the immediate ending of the wartime yarn freeze and the substantial modification of War Production Board order M-588.

Auto Use Tax Due July 1st

Stamps to Go on Sale in Post Offices on Saturday, June 9.

Frank W. Kraemer, Collector of Internal Revenue for District of Connecticut, announced today that the new \$5.00-Automobile Use Tax Stamps will be placed on sale on Saturday, June 9, 1945. The law requires the owner of every motor vehicle which is used upon the highways to buy this stamp and to display it on the vehicle beginning July 1, 1945.

Persons alleging that this tax has been repaid. The stamps will be sold over the counter at all post offices and the following offices of the Collector: Bridgeport, Stamford, Waterbury, New Britain, New Haven, and Hartford. In addition, the Collector of Internal Revenue will fill small orders when accompanied by money orders or certified checks. Personal checks not certified cannot be accepted for the purchase of revenue stamps.

Place on Windshield. The law requires that the stamp be prominently displayed on the motor vehicle on and after July 1, 1945. Where possible, the stamp should be placed on the windshield.



Maneuvers Begun

The victorious Allies, one month after the fall of Germany, have formally begun the institution of a planned system for governing that defeated country. General Eisenhower yesterday took to Berlin, accompanied by members of his staff who will have responsibilities in the problem of governing Germany and the countries immediately under the occupying Allies. American newspapermen went along, too. The declarations signed by Eisenhower yesterday set Germany into pre-aggression borders. Within those borders, it will be divided into four zones of occupation with the "greater" Allies comprising a fifth zone which will be also subdivided into four zones. Each occupying nation will have full individual authority over the zone of its occupation, but the Allied Control Commission, and its subsidiary organizations, is charged with the duty of finding, by unanimous vote, a common answer to problems which must inevitably concern the whole of Germany.

The division of greater Berlin into four zones will bring each of the conquering Allies to its place in the symbolic heart of defeated Germany, and thus dispose of the rumored possibility that Russia would be able to continue shutting the western world off from the capital of Germany.

All this is but a beginning. It was painfully slow in arriving, and it remained, after yesterday's meeting, just a beginning. Although American, British and French members of the Allied Control Commission assumed that the commission would have immediately set down to work in Berlin, Marshal Zhukoff, the Russian member, revealed himself to be without authority, from Moscow, to begin such work, and indicated that the reason for such lack of authority was the fact that British and American troops are still occupying territory which belongs in the Russian sphere of occupation.

That there is some trouble over the final demarcation of the respective zones of occupation is indicated by the fact that none of the declarations signed yesterday attempted to fix beyond an existing date these zones. In other words, the task of governing Germany is going to be as complicated and full of possible trouble as any one has predicted. It is going to be an acid test of the ability of the victorious Allies to cooperate on a problem of the peace, and there are going to be many things which are not going to go smoothly.

Nevertheless, the beginning has been made. The Allies have succeeded in pledging themselves to a scheme and a system for accomplishing their task. They have established the general framework, which is in itself an exciting feat of tension, and although the filling in of details may be slow, it is also certain. And perhaps, on this meeting ground, Russia may find gradual reasons to permit herself some trust of her Allies.

Senator Wheeler Abroad. It was not to be expected that such a great lover of international cooperation as Senator Burton K. Wheeler could lead a group of Senators on a tour of Europe without provoking trouble of one kind or another. And the kind of trouble Senator Wheeler would inspire could be predicted. It came when the Senator and his colleagues engaged in a discussion of international affairs before American soldiers at a Red Cross club in Rome. Talking to the men who had just helped win the European war, Senator Wheeler apparently devoted his usual generous talents to the
