Forrestal Asserts Peacetime Service Training Essential

Preparation 'to Fight Any International Ruffian Who Tries to Impose His Will on World By Force' Advocated By Navy Secretary.

Washington, June 15.—(AP)—Peacetime military training is essential to fight any international ruffian who attempts to impose his will on the world by force, Secretary of the Navy James Forrestal asserted today.

Saying that those in favor of peacetime "demobilization" are in effect asking us to leave the world unprotected, Forrestal declared that the Navy is preparing to fight the "any ruffian" paper-hanger anywhere who may be dreaming of world domination.

Some German plants—several hundred in number, have been permitted to reopen for production since the military government considers essential, but present Allied regulations prohibit German plants to operate only if their products are wanted by the Allied forces or if production is essential to maintain a minimum standard of life for the German civilian population.

The secretary's testimony came after Chairman Woodrow D. Adams read letters from Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz and Admiral William F. Halsey commending enactment of the training program.

"If there is any possible way of avoiding a repetition of what we have been through for the last four years, that way should be a statement prepared for delivery before the committee."

Referring to the support of Army and Navy leaders for compulsory military training, Forrestal said the committee "in no sense" can discard "such expert testimony and go back to the comfortable inertia and blind complacency which for two years we have lived under."

He pointed out that the Japanese were ready to invade the United States at any time.

"The plan is to try to find the answer 'in to try it. Congress, he pointed out, has passed legislation at any time."

Forrestal said that the Navy would be preponderantly in favor of universal military training.

Heat to Hold Until Monday Through Area

Occasional Showers Expected to Keep Temperatures in New England Somewhere in 80s

Boston, June 15.—(AP)—A heat wave that has kept New Englanders sweating the past two days continued but occasional showers following an electrical storm yesterday were expected to keep the temperatures in the 80s.

The Boston Weather Bureau said that the showers and thunder showers will bring only temporary relief however, and that the heat wave will continue through Sunday.

New England sweltered in the record-breaking heat yesterday as a sudden electrical storm plunged the temperature 30 degrees in four hours.

Storm Causes Much Damage

The storm wrought trees, smashed windows, snapped telegraph and telephone lines, overturned small boats and scattered thousands of dollars damage.

Many New Hampshire and Vermont were reported to have been hit hardest by the storm.

An electrical storm followed a short time later by another knocked out scores of telegraph, telephone and electric lines in Lovell and crippled the power in sections of Auburn.

In the Norway-Paris area alone 300 telephone services were disrupted and at South Paris streets and driveways were washed out and power lines downed.

Plan to Hurry Tax Revisions

Program Designed to Improve Cash Position for Business.

Washington, June 15.—(AP)—Plans were laid today to speed through Congress a tax revision program designed to improve the cash position of business and industry by \$5,000,000,000 during recovery.

Chairman Doughton (D., N.C.) of the House Ways and Means committee announced he will introduce the business-tax bill Monday.

Representative Knutson (R., Minn.), Republican leader in the tax-training committee, predicted the legislation would be passed by the House within a week or 10 days.

Public Hearings to Open Tuesday

The committee expects to open public hearings Tuesday in Washington. The measure produces no material reduction in ultimate tax burdens, but is intended to speed post-war payments on rebates and Treasury debt.

The bill would make billions of dollars available for reconstruction.

No change in either the individual or corporation income tax rates is contemplated at this time.

Doughton's bill will embody recommendations made jointly by the Treasury department and War Tax Committee and the House Ways and Means committee.
