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





Take No. 1 first. Decides on Use of Force The Security council is that part the United Nations which derides, by vote of the 11 members on the council, whether to use the armed force of the United Nations USO, United Seamen's Servi to suppress aggression. Our delegate on the Security Field Service and the 15 Unit.

Our delegate on the Security council is Edward R. Stettinius, Jr. He, of course, will vote to use our armed forces—or not to use—only as our government wishes him to vote. But does the president have the authority to tell him to vote to use our Army and Navy against some nation? Some experts on the con-stitution say the president has this power.
