

. Don't sit in direct glare. Shade every flight to eliminate glare and use indirect reflector lamps wherever possible. Have light come over your left shoulder. Never tread facing light.



4. Rest your eyes occasionally. Your ayes move four or five times on every line of type. To read an average magazine article requires about 40,000 muscular move-menta. Se stop and rest awhile.


