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# The Doctor Says:

**Use of Sleeping Pills.**  
**Demands Greatest Caution**

Sleeping pill deaths from accidental overdoses are becoming more common, according to public health authorities. Laws regulating the sale of these drugs are found on most of the statute books, but illicit traffic has grown. It would be ideal if these drugs were never placed in the hands of the patient, but were administered by some one else. Barbiturates are habit-forming.

Sleeping pills are sold under many trade names, but most of them are some form of the barbiturates or barbital. They depress the brain and spinal cord and produce an effect which varies from calmness, to deep sleep, to unconsciousness. The action depends not only on the drug used but also on the way in which it is taken.

Most barbiturate sleep causes 20 to 30 minutes of unconsciousness, and it is said to be painless and refreshing. Some of the long-acting drugs cause a hangover on awakening. Barbiturates cannot produce sleep if the patient is in pain unless they are combined with some other drug. Those who use these drugs to induce pain-free sleep may develop tolerance or take an overdose.

Sleep induced by barbiturates can be deep enough to perform certain operations. It is given by vein for this purpose. The patient falls asleep suddenly. In recovery, there may be a certain amount of restlessness which quickly passes. At times a long sleep follows, from which the patient awakens refreshed. The drugs are used for the control of convulsions in epilepsy.

All of the sleeping pill fatalities occur in those who take overdoses, as the ordinary dose prescribed by physicians never gives any trouble. There is a twilight zone in the drug action in which mistakes may occur. As many distraught individuals are given sleeping pills, there is danger of their taking too many.

If the patient survives for a day from an overdose, recovery usually takes place. The stomach should be washed with a stomachic tube as ordinary emetics are not effective. Stimulants and artificial respiration are usually necessary. Call a physician if poisoning is suspected.

A hangover from a small dose may occur in feeble individuals. Excitement may be so great that they are suspected of being intoxicated. Some people develop sensitivity of the skin from their use. While ordinarily they do not cause destruction of white cells, they may be combined with other drugs, which do.
