The War Criminals... Not only the surviving leaders of Nazism, but professional soldiers who consider war a business...

Not only the surviving leaders of Nazism, but professional soldiers who consider war a business, diplomats who consider lying and plotting a business, and a great industrialist who considered making the goods of war a highly respectable business...

Under the world's previous code, diplomats who plot and to produce new war are given safe conducts home when their efforts have succeeded in producing war. Under the world's previous code, generals who plan and then execute a campaign of aggression are professional gentlemen who are merely playing a game, as some of the captured German generals said after their captors seemed to agree. Under the world's previous code, the industrialist who made the guns for aggressive war and who, on the side, stimulated the war which would use his guns, was merely a harmless civilian minding his own business.

Under the code for these present trials prepared and proposed by Justice Jackson, such acts are listed as legal crimes, and if conviction follows the trials, the code will have become a fact and a precedent directed to the future. It is all very simple and just. All the Jackson code says is that the men who plan war and produce war shall no longer safely have the privilege of sending their fellow countrymen out to die without planning any risks to their own persons. Millions of Germans died in this war, and together the millions of them did not begin to possess the guilt lodged in any single one of these present defendants. It is high common sense and high justice that the men who caused these deaths should pay too. But this will be the first time it has been done.

Hiroshi's Good Moment... An explanation of why Ambassador Grew has constantly favored the retention of Hiroshi, and of why he was successful in urging that policy comes in the information offered by the Pearl Harbor reports.

According to the report, there was one last effort made in Japan to avert war with the United States. That effort came after Tojo had become Japanese premier, and, significantly, retained his active army status despite his new position. Tojo came before the board on Oct. 25th, according to the board's summary of Ambassador Grew's reports. "The Emperor ordered the Privy Council before him and asked them what they intended war. When they refused to answer, he instructed them that there should be no war with the United States. This was the final effort by conservative Japanese to avoid war."

The Emperor's order, obviously, had no influence upon the speaker.

Connecticut Yankee

What Connecticut politics really needs is a law which will decrease the authority of the man who didn't have authority enough to prevent the war. There is no assurance for the future. There is no guarantee that if a new military clique should rise to power in Japan, Hirohito wouldn't once more be their tool, unwillingly perhaps, but obediently. He will, in short, be a reliable emperor only so long as he is taking orders from us.

Necessary Job Well Done

Acting on the recommendation of Elmer Davis, President Truman has abolished the OWI. Thus another purely wartime agency takes its last breath and retires from the scene. During the existence of the OWI there were all kinds of self-fashioned experts in Congress and elsewhere who were fond of proclaiming that there was no need for the organization, that it was a nest of Communists, that it was engaged in passing out Roosevelt political propaganda. And to judge from their frequent criticisms, the nation was full of editors such as whom we are confident that he could do a much better job than Elmer Davis was doing. When some mistake did occur, it was magnified and distorted. It was magnified and distorted in good things the OWI did do. In this kind of war, which was a war of words and ideas just as much as it was a war of guns, the OWI, or something like it, was an absolute necessity for this country. So far as we were able to observe, it kept its operations remarkably clean of political slant. And Elmer Davis, for the most part, remained the same sane, intelligent, level-headed individual he was before he took office.

6 ways to protect your eyesight

1. Don't sit in direct glare. Shade every light to eliminate glare and use indirect reflector lamps wherever possible. Have light come over your left shoulder. Never read facing light.

2. Avoid reflected glare. Guard against light reflected into the eyes from shiny surfaces. A highly polished table should be covered if you are to work or read at it for any length of time.

3. Don't sit in your own shadow. Reading or working in your own shadow can cause severe eyestrain. Your shadow can reduce the amount of light on an object to 1/16 the normal intensity.

4. Rest your eyes occasionally. Your eyes move four or five times on every line of type. To read an average magazine article requires about 40,000 muscular movements. So stop and rest awhile.

5. Keep bulbs clean. Remove your bulbs and bowls occasionally to give them a bath in warm, soapy water. The brighter they are the brighter your light. Dirty bulbs can mean 25% to 30% less light.

6. Use tight bulbs. Floor lamps should have 100 watt; table lamps, 100 to 150 watts; reflector lamps, 300 watts; 2-socket lamps, 60 to 75 watts; 3-socket lamps, 40 to 60 watts; kitchen, 150 watts.
