





(2) What was the material of the tomic bomb? Scientists called it U-235.

st of metals, with an atomic weight o est of metals, with an atomic weight of 235, which means it is approximately 235 times heavier than hydrogen. In the explosion, much of the substance of the metal vanished. Matter was turned into energy. This is the secret of atomic power. In the bomb, neutrons were fired at the hearts of uranium atoms. Neu-trons are subatomic particles without electric, charge. As a neutron hits a uranium atom, the atom breaks in two. Each atom gives off at least two more neutrons. These two neutrons hit two more atoms, breaking them in two and more atoms, breaking them in two and giving off four neutrops. The four break

up four atoms, releasing eight neutrons. The process is shown in the diagram above. The neutrons travel at a rate of about 20,000 miles a second, so the whole process takes an infinitely short time. Each atomic fragment had a field of force around it extending for a great distance. During an infinitesimal time, the rate of the explosion increases with great rapidity and thus is compounded into terrific force.

(2) Although the explosive material in the bomb is believed to have weighed only a few pounds, the entire bom
