





May Try Another Angle Farm officials now are thinking strongly of tackling the post-war arm price problem from another They feel certain that i downturn in farm prices is ahead, American agriculture is capable producing more than markets will take at present prices. The government is committed, under wartime legislation, to sup port farm prices at not less than

90 per cent of parity for two years after the end of the war. The objective of this commitmen is to prevent too sharp a dro in prices while farmers adjusted their production from high war-time levels to smaller peacetime There is strong belief among the

administration's top-rung advisers that farm prices should be allowed to drop to levels dictated by supply and demand. Would Pay Difference

The difference between the free price and 90 per cent of parityproviding, of course, that the ac-tual price is below 90 per cent of narity-would be paid the farmer n the form of government pay-For example, suppose that

the case of eggs, 90 per cent of parity is 27 cents a dozen. If under supply and demand, egg sold for only 24 cents, the gove ment would pay the farmer three cents a dozen instead of trying hold the market price at 27 cents. Or, in the case of wheat, sup-pose that the 90 per cent of parity price is \$1.30 a bushel, but that a free-play of domestic and foreign markets sets a price of 90 cents. The government would pay the farmer the difference 40 cents.

Buyer Gets More for Money It is contended that this plan has the advantage of permitting the buyer-domestic as well as foreign-to get more for his money, thus encouraging increased consumption of farm products. Either approach to the farm price problem—that of supporting market prices at the 90 per cent of parity level, or by permitting them to drop below that level and of supplementing them with gov ernment payments-would + cost the government large sums Advocates of the cheap plan contend theirs would be cheaper and in the long-time in-terest of farmers as well as con-
