Brief Session Of Selectmen

Adjourn Early to Pay Respects to Registrar Of Voters Veitch

The Selectmen's meeting last night was one of the shortest held in recent months as the members voted to adjourn in time to go to the home of Registrar of Voters, Robert N. Veitch, to pay their respects. Mr. Veitch died after a short illness Monday morning.

Observe Law On Sidewalks

No Police Action Necessary on Cleaning Off Snow This Year

Manchester's new by-law, concerning the removal of ice and snow, which carries a penalty of arrest and fine for non-compliance with the provisions for removing snow and ice within 24 hours after the close of a storm, is so well observed that there has been no occasion for the local court to take action on any offenders.

Copies of the new by-law were provided the police department, the enforcing agency under the law, so that all police would become familiar with the new by-law but it has not been necessary to take action to date.

Two sections of the by-law which describe the duties of the police under the act are as follows:

"Section 3. It shall be the duty of the police force, under the direction of the chief of police, to see that the foregoing provisions relating to snow and ice are strictly complied with.

"Section 4. It shall be the duty of the police force to report for prosecution all cases of violation of, or refusal or neglect to comply with the provisions of this by-law relating to ice and snow."

Senate Votes For UNO Plan

Washington, Dec. 5.—The Senate turned today to further relief for victims of war after voting 65 to 7 for active participation in the peace-seeking United Nations organization.

Senator McClellan (D., Tenn.) pressed to step down from the presiding officer's position to try for speedy approval of a \$550,000,000 UNRRA appropriation. It is the final installment of this country's original pledge to the United Nations. He and Representative Vandenberg (R., Mich.) defeated an amendment to delay the last installment and today opened debate on a second \$1,300,000,000 pledge.

McClellan will pass the dinner hour last night banged his gavel on Senate passage of the UNO bill setting up machinery for this country's active role in the infant organization. The measure now goes to the House where Chairman Bloom (D., N. Y.) of the foreign Affairs committee told reporters he hoped for final passage before the Dec. 20 holiday recess.

A UNO organization meeting is scheduled in London next month.

Only Seven Vote "No"

Senate passage found only one Democrat, Senator Wheeler (Mont.), and six Republicans, Senators Langer (N. Dak.), Moore (Okla.), Beveridge (W. Va.), Shipstead (Maine), Tamm (Ohio), and Wherry (Nebr.) voting "No" on the final roll call.

Wheeler protested that the legislation would give present power to invade this country in violation without approval of Congress or the public.

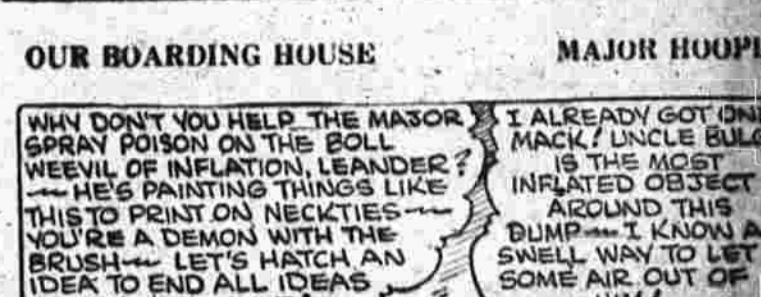
