





manufacturers again have changed their forecasts about that new set for Christmas. Now they say comparatively few will be available.

A month ago they thought maybe there would be a half-million around. That in turn was a re-fluction from a previous forecast. The latest survey by the Radio Manufacturers Association says that while "most large set man-ufacturers have exhibited 1946 models to dealers and distributors, there will be relatively few new radio sets on the dealers' shelves before Christmas" because "pro-duction has been spotty and small " small.

These "reconversion delays continues to ascribe as caused "chiefly by pricing and OPA administrative difficulties." Coupled therewith is a "shortage of radio components, also due largely to pricing troubles," as well as indi-cations of "some labor difficulties. The association says that as i

result manufacturers generally do not anticipate volume production "well into next year," with capa-city output possibly not reached before summer. Another effect, it concludes, is that "development o FM broadcasting and television will be retarded. -


