The statement, which was sent to the governments of Russia, Britain and France, constituted the first detailed interpretation by any power of the general policy for Germany produced at the Potsdam Big Three meeting in August.

American officials were unwilling to predict how the other three occupying powers might receive the policy declared.

**Based On Present Boundaries**  
They said, however, that the American plan was based on the assumption that Germany would retain its present boundaries, excluding the industrial Ruhr and Silesia areas.

This assumed position for France, which has insisted that those two zones be stripped from Germany, was not mentioned in a supplementary statement on the policy declaration. Secretary of State Byrnes said three stages would be involved in Germany's return to "normal".

Critics of British Operations Answered

London, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Minister of State Philip J. Noel-Baker, answering critics of British military operations against the Indonesian forces in Java "must continue to do what is necessary to ensure the safety of Allied prisoners of war" and internees.

He demanded that the "Dutch and Indonesian shall sit down together and work out their differences on the basis of concrete proposals on both sides without any further delay."

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Fights Going To Louisiana

Southern Liquor Dealer Testifies Over Ceiling Price Paid to Semel

Hartford, Dec. 12.—(AP)—A Louisiana liquor dealer testified today that he had paid \$37.97 per case for 506 cases of whiskey from N. Tully Semel and his United Distillers Corporation of Amston, paying \$22.03 per case more than the ceiling price of \$15.94.

The dealer, Conell John of the Jones Beverage Company, testified yesterday before United States Commissioner William J. Whelan, who is presiding at removal hearings by which the government seeks to bring Semel into the jurisdiction of the Federal district of Louisiana where he has been indicted on charges of violating ceiling price regulations.

Orders Filing of Briefs hearing the testimony, Whelan directed opposing counsel to file briefs within two weeks. Semel, who testified that his liquor deal was arranged by James J. Neeld, a New Brunswick, N. J., firm, with whom he came to Connecticut in mid-August. After making arrangements with Neeld, Semel testified, he received the whiskey by rail, paying the ceiling price of \$15.94 per case by cash.

John told the commissioner that he wanted outside Semel's Amston office while Neeldman talked to the defendant, and "when he came out of the office, he said Semel had agreed to stand behind whatever agreement he (Neeldman) made with me."

Price Not Discussed Under cross-examination, John said that when he met Semel subsequently the price of whiskey was not discussed. Semel in his testimony admitted meeting John, but denied that he ever agreed to sell him any whiskey. He insisted he made the sale of the 506 cases in question to the New Brunswick concern. Semel is also involved with authorities of the Connecticut Federal district, and is to appear Friday at a hearing on a petition by the government which would require him to produce the records of his company for Internal Revenue agents.

## Resume Farm Trade Exhibit

Vegetable Growers to Hold Annual Meeting in Waterbury

Storrs, Dec. 12.—Nine speakers representing growers, commercial firms and state and federal agencies will address the 33rd annual meeting of the Connecticut Vegetable Growers' Association to be held in Temple Hall, Waterbury, December 18 and 19. The trade exhibit, resumed this year after an absence of several years because of war conditions, will display production equipment and marketing supplies.

Mayor Thomas J. Monagan of Waterbury will be the guest speaker at the Association's annual banquet in the Hotel Elton on the evening of the 18th. A program of entertainment and dancing will follow the banquet.

Opening the morning session on the first day, William Killie of Swanton, N. J., one of the largest vegetable growers in his state, will discuss tomato varieties and production. The 1946 national outlook for vegetables will be presented by Paul Finden of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington. Mr. Finden will give particular attention to potato and tomato production goals for 1946 and setting and support prices. What the future holds for the Connecticut vegetable industry will be outlined by Prof. A. E. Wilkinson, vegetable specialist of the Agricultural Extension Service, University of Connecticut. Sweet corn production is the subject for discussion by J. W. Robson of Heli, N. Y., one of the largest growers in the state. C. P. H. Wundhoff, secretary-treasurer of the Pennsylvania Cooperative Potato Growers' Association of Williamsport, will describe the experiences of his organization in marketing potatoes. Walter Withrow, commercial strawberry grower of Clinton, Conn., will discuss strawberry varieties and production as the first speaker on the second day. He will be followed by Earl French, national marketing director of the Atlantic Complantation Company, New York City, who will tell about the marketing of miscellaneous vegetables.

The annual business meeting of the Association will take place immediately after lunch, with committee reports, reports on the vegetable work at the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station in New Haven, and selection of officers to receive the attention of members.

Following the business session, Prof. Robert G. Hepburn of the University of Connecticut will discuss the maintenance of fertility in vegetable soils. Final speaker on the two-day program will be Dr. F. M. East of the New Jersey Agricultural Experiment Station, New Brunswick, a nationally known authority on soils who will outline some of the soil and plant problems relating to New Jersey's intensive agriculture.

**Whom Are We To Fight?**  
 Organized labor has begun testifying on the issue of peacetime conscription before the House Military Affairs Committee, and its first representative, from the American Federation of Labor, hit the issue squarely with the elemental, common sense question the proponents of conscription never try to answer.

Whom, the labor spokesmen wanted to know, is the United States preparing to fight?

The proponents of conscription like to evade that question with vague and threatening assumptions that our enemies in this war, Germany and Japan, are once more going to be threats to world peace. But they themselves know only too well that Germany and Japan could ever again threaten the peace, and that would have to be because we and our allies helped them do it. They can only attain military power again if we want them to have it. So, if we want to protect ourselves and the world from the world's classic enemies, we have only to use an ounce of supervision and control to see that they stay disarmed.

Whom, then, is the United States, with its arsenal of atomic bombs, its overwhelming navy, its plans for universal military training, planning to fight?

The answer can't be found by listing our past enemies. It can only be found by listing our allies. Only Britain, Russia or China can begin to possess the size and resources and manpower adequate to test the unparalleled military strength we are proposing to create for ourselves. These must be our potential enemies, if there is any justification to the conscription proposal.

Why do not the proponents of conscription admit this, and stop hiding behind a mysterious assumption that Germany or Japan can rise again? Because they know that the people of this country would not support conscription, or any other extravagant military measure, if they felt such measures were aimed at any one of our allies. For that reason they have not dared tell us whom we are preparing to fight, and will not dare tell us. Yet until they do answer the challenge put to them, they cannot possibly deserve the honest of intelligent support of the American people.

**Hueley Charges Fizzle**  
 With the approval of practically every one except General Patrick J. Hueley himself, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee has closed and dropped its investigation of his charges against the State Department. Even those who are always ready to take up the "gauge of battle" against the "career men" of the State Department have concluded that this is not a particularly auspicious time for an assault on those much maligned individuals whose chief fault seems to be that they are specially trained in their jobs.

As for General Hueley himself, he proclaims himself dissatisfied with the outcome, and now declares his intention of documenting his charges against the career men and carrying his fight to the public. But if he were capable of documenting his charges, if he were capable of making them stick, he should certainly have done it before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

The net result of the two week "hustle" created by General Hueley seems to be that another prominent American figure, too prominent in the eyes of his fellow Americans, but perhaps not so well understood abroad, has

**Japan As Test Tube**  
 Reading General MacArthur's latest order to Japan—that concerning the Japanese farm system—we find ourselves close to the conclusion that if the millennium is ever going to arrive on earth, Japan is going to be its first destination. When one considers the reforms that are being introduced in Japan by a simple wave of the MacArthur wand, one cannot but compare this magical procedure with the tortuous progress of military reform in the United States. It took America decades, for instance, to provide itself with a system of voting suffrage similar to that Japan gets by simple MacArthur decree.

And what MacArthur is now doing with the Japanese farm problem and farm tenant problem is something for America to watch with envy. Japan's version of the absentee landlord, for instance, to provide itself with a system of voting suffrage similar to that Japan gets by simple MacArthur decree.

Other portions of General MacArthur's instructions to Japan—order the stabilization of farm prices—a bitter pill to those Japanese farm interests who are taking advantage of the food shortage to reap fortunes for themselves. And that, of course, can be compared to the way farm interests in the United States successfully secured most OPA controls during the war, and when those controls were imposed, escaped into the black market.

From such instances of policy, it would seem that Japan, when we get through with it, is going to be just about the most perfect and democratic little country in the world, far more perfect and democratic by simple decree than we ourselves have become through our own long process of evolution. Thanks to the fact that our decrees are issued by right of conquest, there is no landlord's bloc or farmer's lobby to stand in the way of progress. Reform rides roughshod, when it is the will of the conqueror. Thanks to defeat by us, Japan seems about to make two thousand years of progress in 1945. It is, needless to say, a fascinating experiment, the vital question being that of whether democracy can work by decree, or must first dwell in the hearts and aspirations of those who are to hold it.

Will the Japanese people know how to use and protect the advantages being given them?

Our first instinct is to guess that such ready-made democracy will not work. But, on the other hand, it may be that all people everywhere, no matter what the previous condition of their benighted servitude, are more zealous and ready for freedom than is generally admitted. Whatever the answer, Japan seems to be the test tube which will provide it.

Our subtitle there is beginning to look like the greatest social and political experiment in all human history.
