



Bridgeport, Dec. 13 - (A) tridgeport industrialists believe, says a Chamber of Commerce ponsored survey, that if industry n this area granted a 30 per cent wage increase without receiving "corresponding price relief" 42,000 of 59,000 industrial employes would become instantly jobless," and many of the other 17,000 "would be out of jobs within a comparatively short time." Three Sections Now Complete Three sections of the highway are now complete, one running from the end of the Merritt parkway at the Housatonic river to a point in Orange southwest of New Haven, the section between Meriden and the Charter Oak bridge in Hartford where the recently widened Berlin turnpike is considered part of the system, and the section between the Massachusett state line and the town of Tolland. From the Housatonic to the Connecticut rivers the road is called the Wilbur Cross parkway. and from Hartford to the Massa chusetts line, a portion where construction is being carried out with the assistance of Federal aid and trunkline highway funds, it known as the Wilbur Cross high way, an all-purpose road unlike the other part from which commercial traffic will be barred.

Grading Contracts Awarded Six miles at each end of the section between New Haven and Meriden have been graded, and contracts for grading the 10-mile intermediary stretch have been awarded. This job should be finished by the end of next year. The department said bridges and other structures will be built during the same period and paving will start sometimes during the 1946-47 fiscal year.
