Rural Interests Fear Reapportionment Plan

New Haven, Hartford and Fairfield Counties Seen Likely to Get Majority in Senate

Hartford, March 21.—(AP)—Conservative rural interests fear that the proposed state Senate reapportionment plan would give New Haven, Hartford and Fairfield counties a majority of seats in the upper chamber.

This view was voiced by A. Ward Spaulding, Connecticut Grange representative, as he opposed the plan yesterday at a hearing of the Senate Reapportionment committee held in the State House.

Spaulding asserted the institution of considerable research and fact-finding work. Spaulding described how 114 city patients were sent there and cared for "absolutely free" during his four terms as mayor.

Opponents charged the institution is a "rich man's par-dise" and that "it incorporates all the features of a hospital, university and country club."

Hartford Corporation Counsel Samuel H. Aron said "it clings to a policy which divorces itself from the regular public."

"The institute has turned a cold shoulder to Connecticut and Hartford," he continued. "Let it mend its ways and make its services available to the general public. It does not deserve it and it does not need tax exemption."

Hartford Assessor George F. Kinneale declared the tax exemption would mean "the elimination of the state aid hospital system in Connecticut."

in that country and had expressed hope that the treaty would be completed in the Moscow meeting.

He said that it was for this purpose—completing the treaty—that the Austrian government representatives should be called into consultation.

Offers Six-Step Plan

Bevin laid before the council a six-step plan for the creation of a federalized government structure intended to make Germany a self-governing, democratic state.

Britain's views on the government structure for Germany were set forth in a 600-word paper.

It called for creation of a two-house Legislature along the lines of the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives, a president and executive powers and strong state rights.

Bevin was the first of the four ministers here to place his ideas on the structure of the German state before the council.

Informants said the British plan envisioned a lower chamber elected according to population and an upper chamber elected on the basis of a fixed number of representatives from each of the Länder (States).

This central organization for Germany would have power over foreign policy and such external matters as the export-import program, while the states would retain most of the executive rights.

It was expected France and the United States would support the British proposal and the Russians, who want a strong central government, would oppose it.

The ministers gave precedence today to a review of the progress of their drafting a new treaty for Austria.

Marshall and Bevin were reported to be prepared to try and speed up the drafting job, if it is at all possible, in order to have a treaty established as a sovereign state without delay and to obtain withdrawal of occupation forces there and of supporting troops in Romania and Hungary.

Russia was given the right, in the recently signed treaties for Romania and Hungary, to maintain forces in those two countries to guard communications lines for their occupation forces in Austria.

No Appreciable Progress

The deputies working on the Austrian problem, from which the ministers gained a progress report last night, actually have made no appreciable progress during the two weeks of sessions here in solving puzzles carried over from their earlier meetings in London.

What the Council of Foreign Ministers does toward breaking the deadlock, primarily involving arguments between Russia and the western powers, will determine the prospects for finalizing the treaty here.

In the meantime, it appeared that the French-British stalemate over German coal exports had become another major barrier on the road to reaching agreement on a German-economic program—but there was widespread belief that both sides would make every effort to complete the negotiations.

Rockville Ger-Ron Head Gives His Side

President of Firm Declares He Took No Active Part in Business

Rockville, March 21.—(Special)—The afternoon session of the closing of the fourth week of the Ger-Ron Turkey Farm case, George L. Roudsides, of Leominster, Mass., president of the Ger-Ron Farms Corporation and one of the five persons charged with conspiracy to cheat and defraud in connection with turkey sale, told the court that he had no active part in the corporation's management and did not know that customers were overcharged.
