By The Associated Press A Federal conciliator declared the government was "hopeful" of a settlement today in the long distance phase of the nation-wide telephone strike as the American pub-lic adjusted itself to sharply curtailed telephone service Federal Conciliator Peter G. Manno told newsmen as negotia-tions were resumed in Washington between spokesmen for the Ameri-can Union of Telephone Workers representing long distance em ployes and the American Tele-phone and Telegraph Company's forg lines division: "We are hopeful that a settle-ment will be effectuated in the long lines today." Would Not End Entire Walkout Manno emphasized, howeven that settlement of long lines dis-putes would not end the entire walkout of 294,000 telephons workers. Long distance services has hit telephone users hardest in the two-day old strike. In New York city A.T.&T. an-nounced that the nation's long strike as the American pub-

nounced that the nation's long distance telephone operations were at 27 per cent of normal ip mid-morning. The company said a total of only one-fourth the normal number of operations were at work in these 14 cities: Views Sought New York, Pittsburgh, Detroit, st. Louis, Memphis, Cleveland, Cincinnati, Philadelphia, Buffalo, Boston, Louisville, Minneapolis, Chicago and Ransas City, Mo.

For Children Here





He just said U. N. couldn't do the kind of job that was needed. As the realization of what all this meant sank into people's minds, voices were raised in this country that we were by-passing U. N. and maybe destroying it. Great Many Bothered This bothered a great many peo-ple, including senators who wanted o vote the aid. So in time this plan was fashioned: We'll go ahead and help out Greece and Turkey. Later on we'll stop giving the aid if the U. N thinks we should stop. But—are we going to present the plan to U. N. in such form that future U. N. opposition to our actions is helpless and useless? Congress will have to decide ust how much power, in positive language, it's willing to let U. N. have over our European actions. Further: If enough nations are friendly to the United States, or indebted for-favors, U. N. isn't likely to tell us to quit Greek-Turkish aid. Might Reverse Tables Might Reverse Lines But suppose at some future time Russia reverses the tables and starts pouring money and arms into a European -country without consulting U.
