Judge Dismisses Robbery Charges

Hartford, June 11—(AP)—Superior Court Judge John M. Conley dismissed charges of armed robbery against two Springfield, Mass., youths yesterday after State Attorney Meade Alcorn told the court police questioning had been unable to discount their alibi and that there was reasonable doubt of their guilt.

Robert DeFranco and Patrick G. Staples, both 17, had been accused of holding up a garage in Windsor last March, and had been identified by the garage proprietor and his wife. Alcorn said, however, that one principal witness, whom he did not name, had identified a photograph positively as that of one of the holdup men, but it was not a picture of either of the accused.

The prosecutor said there were witnesses to corroborate the story of the two youths that on the night of the holdup they were in Springfield, one attending a theater and the other making a round of several restaurants.

Prison Sentence Given Physician

Hartford, June 11—(AP)—A 60-year old physician, who had practiced since 1907 in Hartford and in Buffalo, where he has his home, pleaded guilty yesterday in a courtroom that had been cleared of spectators to charges of indecent assault and attempting to procure an abortion.

Superior Court Judge John M. Conley sentenced the defendant, Dr. Edmund J. Lyman, to serve four to 10 years in prison. State Attorney Meade Alcorn, calling the case a "sordid, unwholesome man," told the court he would have recommended a more severe sentence were it not for Dr. Lyman's advanced years.

Dr. Lyman lost his right to practice in 1926 when he was visited of committing an abortion, but the Legislature restored his license by a special act three years later, Alcorn said.

The Aim Of British Policy

President Truman, who cast the die for power politics of the world when he announced the Truman Doctrine in which our own great power was to be used to contain the Russian satellite, has now announced an "outrage" when he responds by taking over Hungary. So it is an outrage, but it is an outrage which was an inevitable product of the Truman Doctrine. It is an outrage because once Mr. Truman had made his own final decision to stop trying to live in one world and to start organizing two worlds, it was an outrage which is part of the general outrage of power politics. And it is questionable how strong a moral position Mr. Truman has in denouncing power politics moves when he himself has adopted the power politics course for America.

But the fact that Mr. Truman should induce himself in such comment, seeming surprised and shocked, is an illustration of either one of two things—either his abysmal ignorance of what the results of the Truman Doctrine would be—or his firm and final conclusion that it is inevitable and that it is his sole task to win it up. We do not know which is the true case; perhaps, tragically, it is a combination of both ignorance and madness in our White House policy.

Between the two, at any rate, this country is proceeding to split the world into two warring camps, to assign all virtues to everything in our own war camp, and to act surprised and shocked whenever the opposition war camp takes the inevitable measure to organize and protect itself. By this course, we are discarding whatever chance there might have been for agreement and compromise between ourselves and Russia. We are discarding whatever chance of success there might have been for the United Nations concept.

Nowhere has our attitude been more clearly emphasized than in the reaction of our natural friends and ally, Britain, to that same event. Mr. Truman, in his blooded mood, labeled an "outrage" the British, obviously enough, is trying to preserve that same possibility of an open, fluid, compromising progress toward one world which the Truman Doctrine has rejected. While the Truman Doctrine is trying to make a hard and fast division of the world, Britain is struggling valiantly and hopefully, precisely to keep the world situation from crystallizing in this way.

This is evident in the manner in which Britain has reacted to the Hungarian situation. The official statement of the British foreign policy position in the House of Commons on Monday said that Britain would judge the new regime in Hungary by its acts. It gave a dispassionate, objective, matter of fact recital of the events in Hungary.

Britain is asking Russia for "clarification" of its policy toward Hungary. "Clarification" was the strongest word used in this official British discussion of the Hungarian question. At the same time, however, it is understood in London that Britain has reacted to the proposed American note to Russia on the question with a recommendation of more caution and moderation on our part.

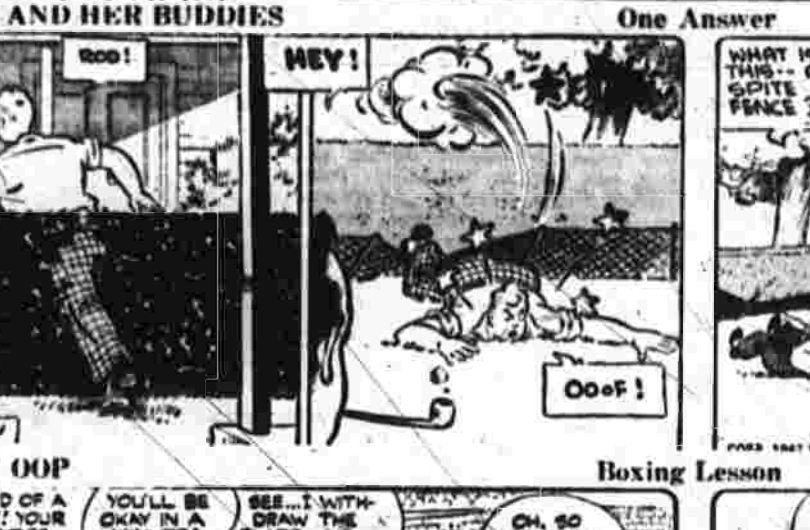

been unbending in its stand against the veto in atomic matters, also insists on unlimited international inspections.

In this connection, Gromyko raised the question later in his speech as to whether the U.S. would have to operate at times through governments rather than directly when he said that the commission should have the right of "requesting from the governments of any nation and checking of various data and reports on the activities of atomic energy facilities."

Gromyko took the floor later to explain that the new proposals were an elaboration of his earlier plan. He stressed that he was not withdrawing Soviet amendments to the American atomic plan, including those affecting the inspection of atomic energy facilities.

He delivered his 15-minute speech in English, appearing before the full 12-nation commission after a working committee yesterday that he was "full of compromise."

Declaring that the Atomic Energy commission has not made due progress in its work even after the commission's majority endorsement of the American (Baruch) plan, Gromyko said it is time to "re-examine the situation."

He added the Soviet union would insist that the task on prohibiting atomic weapons consulting should be the viewpoint of its "necessity."

"Basic Position Not Changed"

He did not change his basic position for immediately outlawing the bomb and only then for a convention setting up an atomic control committee.

In a speech given wide advance publicity, Gromyko's request for a meeting of the full commission—the first since March 19—Gromyko laid out these points:

1. The international control committee should be set up within the framework of the council—where the veto applies.

2. The commission shall have its own inspectorial apparatus.

3. Composition, rights and obligations of the commission, as well as provisions on basis of which it shall act, shall be determined by a special international convention signed by the nations.

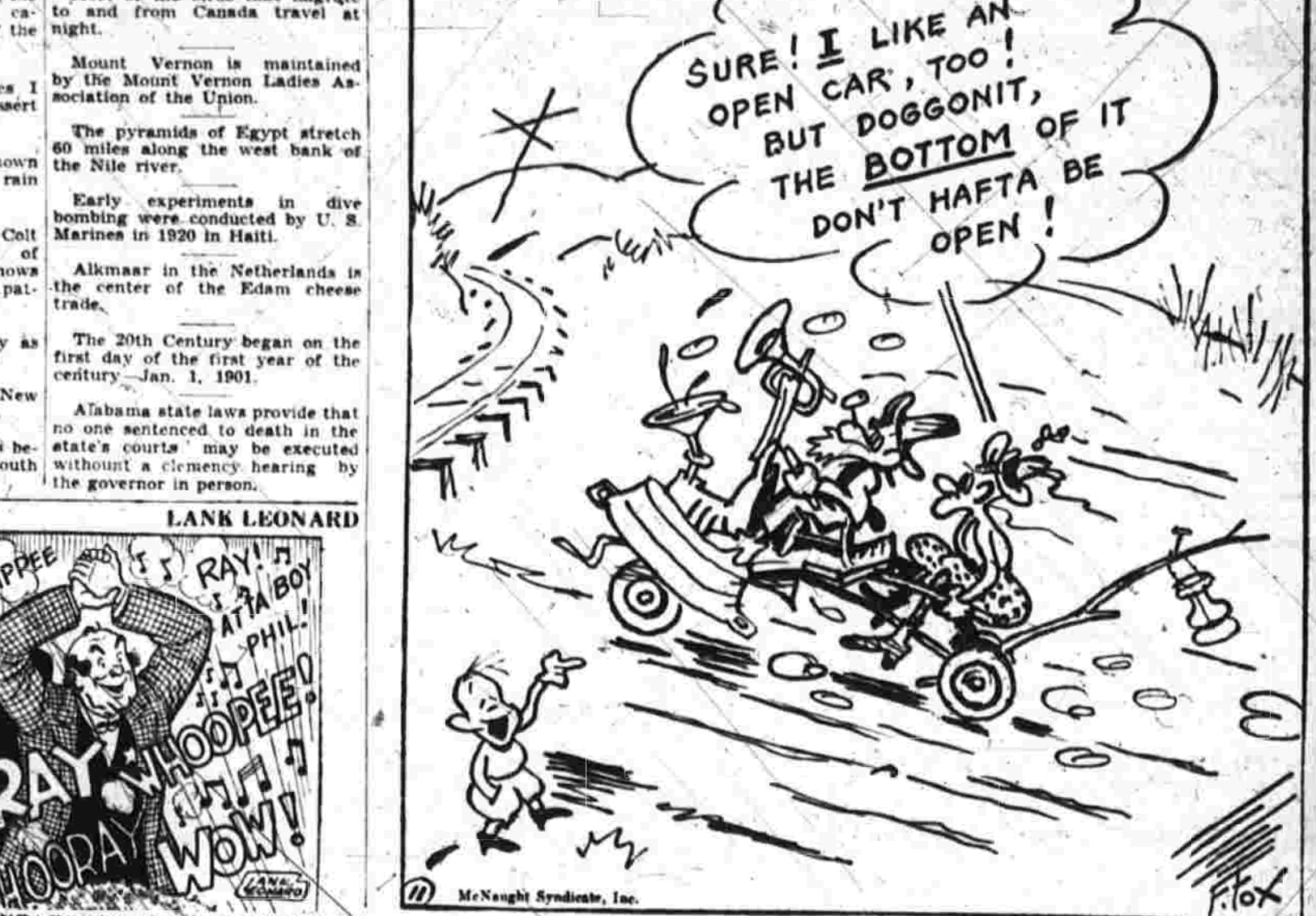
