

It provided that veterans' housing b financed by an eight year \$200,000 bond issue, interest not to exceed one and one half per cent, with bonds in denominations of \$1,000 each. The First National Bank of Boston is made agent in the transaction. The issue will start to mature in 1948, terminating in 1955 The payoff is at the rate of \$25,000 annually, or about one half mill on the current grand list. The bond issue was voted without dissent. The third item in the call was that of an appropriation of \$16,000 for the building of emergency classrooms in existing structures to care for the overflow enrollment n the elementary schools in September, A motion, recommended by the Board of Selectmen was introduced by Mr. England. It provided that the sum spent under direction of the Board
