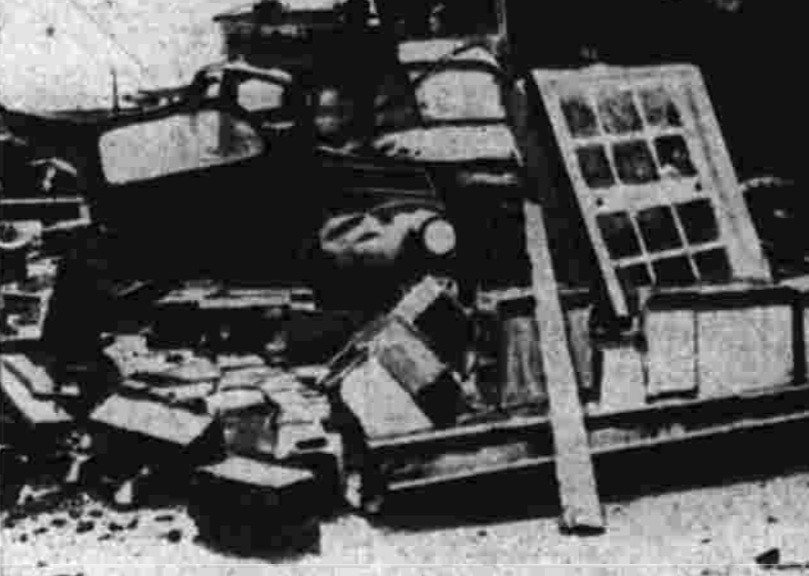

### 2,000 Federal Housing Tenants Protest Bill

Action started at Mass Meeting Here to Enlist Help of Senators to Thwart Disposition of Delegates representing over 2,000 families living in federal housing projects in this area met last night at Silver Lane Homes community house here and started a campaign to defeat the proposed Disposition Bill, already voted by the House, and now before the Senate in Washington, by which it is feared by tenants that their rights will be summarily disposed of.

### Plan to Boost Funds to Help Enforce Law

Under terms of the Wolcott Bill, the entire assets of the Federal Public Housing Authority would be transferred to the Federal Housing Administration, which would be authorized to operate all housing projects in several nearby projects, including Oxford Village in Manchester. Silver Lane Homes likewise it will have jurisdiction for all its units.

But another major provision in effect now. This authorizes the Federal Housing Administration to issue bonds to block or stave off nationalization of the projects.

Five committees, including about 50 members and representatives of Oxford Village, Silver Lane Homes, Wallis Village in East Hartford, and the United States Veterans' Home in East Hartford, have joined in the latest action.

Spokesman for the group says that Silver Lane Homes is being affected by the Wolcott Bill, and in this phase the bill is in the hands of the Senate. The bill is being held up as well as it has been for the past several months.

It is not known if the Wolcott Bill will be passed whether or not the government would sell Silver Lane Homes for salvage purposes or for housing purposes.
