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OUR PRINCIPAL ECONOMY
 John Gunther, in the course of his own experiences and thoughts while collecting the material for and then writing "Inside U. S. A.," could not fail but note the great contrast between the magnificent style with which we solved the unprecedented problems of the last war and the way in which we are handling the problems of the present. He has dimly failed to solve our problems concerning the "two most pressing necessities of life, food and housing."

It is an arresting point. Here we are, the greatest productive nation on earth, and we are unable to meet the American table at a reasonable price. Here we are, the productive marvels of World War production, and we are unable to produce our own bread. It seems nonsensical, doesn't it?

Gunther doesn't try to explain it, except by saying that we lack a sense of national planning. Now we are sure that it can be explained, unless it is explained by a very ugly word: greed.

Now greed is not an abnormal human quality. Perhaps we Americans have more of it than the people of some other nations, but it is not abnormal. But the unusual thing in this particular phase of our history is that we have, in this post-war period, by a process of study, decided to favor greed.

The price of meat is what it is today because our elected representatives in Congress openly succumbed to the greedy arguments of those who, even though they were already making good money, wanted to make profits still more grandiose. They are making those profits now, by full permission of the American Congress.

Senator Raymond E. Baldwin, who wanted in Congress this decision to favor greed, was taken, is currently calling upon this Congress to do something about prices. "It is inconceivable," he says, "that this Congress should close its session without having made the strongest possible effort to at least determine the reason for these high prices which are making the lives of our people so difficult."

"Inconceivable!" Well hardly. What is really inconceivable is that this Congress should seriously concern itself with the question of prices. For one thing, the issue would be too embarrassing for some of its own members. For another, Congress is still willing to decide an issue like this in favor of greed.

You can judge that by the way this Congress is also failing to act on the question of housing. One of the measures it is not going to act upon at this session is the Taft-Henderson housing bill, a mild enough proposal for government stimulation of home building. But, whatever America's housing needs may be, there are powerful interests in America which do not want cheap housing.

These interests on the side of greed include the producers of housing materials, the contractors, labor in the building trades, and the builders themselves. All are quite satisfied with the present shortage and are ignoring every hold-up over their extraordinary profits. They are powerful enough to keep Congress from interfering with the picture. By refusing to act, Congress is again casting its vote on the side of greed.

Before the war, this country was equipped with an ignominious "policy of security," in which our government, at the request of various interests, artificially created scarcities in order to keep prices and profits up.

During the war, when we saw what we could produce and use if

we only had a mind to do it, we did ourselves that we had learned the end of the present reality of two sharply divided worlds.

Some days ago, the British Ambassador made a most unusual and interesting announcement. It was to the effect that three British warships, headed by the cruiser Liverpool, would be visiting the United States on a tour of inspection of our naval base of Severnport on the night of July 25 and 26.

The British warships would sail into the Black Sea for this visit, it was announced, after calling at Istanbul and other Turkish ports. There was in the visit of course a great contrast with the conduct of the American warships which have been roving the Mediterranean for the past few months. They have gone to Athens and to Istanbul in pointed maneuvering to Russia, and no roving in Congress. During the war we did achieve things, because we knew we must hang together in order to survive. Now we are acting as we thought other American were a legitimate right in the great game of greed and grab. There cannot be a good ending to such a policy, not even for those who temporarily succeed in grabbing the money. For this is not really an economy, but a temporary, linnatic policy, all of whose members must inevitably walk the plank of depression.

Straws In The Wind

Two developments concerning Britain should tell us, very shortly, how completely all possibilities of normal friendship in this world has collapsed.

There is a British delegation now in Moscow, discussing with the Russians the terms of a proposed trade agreement between Russia and Britain. The proposed agreement is logical for both countries, promising wheat and timber and fish for Britain, and return for the machinery and electrical equipment Britain makes so well. But the proposed trade agreement was originally viewed as something more than just good business. Britain favored it as an act of international normalcy, and therefore part of Britain's effort to ease the abnormal international tensions created by the rivalries of Britain and the United States. Russia, in turn, probably welcomed it as a sign of her possible ability to drive a wedge between the people of some other nations, but it is then doubtful that this proposed trade agreement can be consummated. It will be so-called "inconceivable" that this

thing of a miracle if it can survive proper.

That attitude on the part of Commissioner Cox toward the end of his career as head of Connecticut's greatest contracting agency, represented no viable change. His attitude when he first assumed office or his attitude as it was revealed in some of the phases of Governor Hussey's present investigation of the highway department.

The unflinching attitude represents the final and conclusive failure of a gentle but persistent campaign on our part. It has been a campaign down through the years to educate Mr. Cox's zone of the more unpleasant facts of political contracting and political office-holding. Mr. Cox's fine sense of innocence in all mankind, his guileless belief in the honorable and selfless intentions of all human beings, has survived our needling, unceasing and unflinching.

Actually, Commissioner Cox was not so innocent. He had been in the highway department since he entered it. It never occurred to him, even when there were facts which other men might have considered full proof, that it was conceivable that a department employee should actually be stealing from the state, or actually conspiring with an outside contractor. He seemed to resent any such possibility, and he actually took some pains to make out special records to certain employees who seemed to certain outsiders, to have been engaged in dubious practices.

It is something of a tribute to the nature of the man himself that he one ever suspected him of dishonesty in such position or in such innocuous. There has never been the slightest suspicion that he himself was capable of dipping one little finger into anything questionable. The fact seems to be that he is a man of such surpassing integrity and honor that he can be guilty of nothing less of all his low human beings.

Such qualities might be an asset in a certain kind of world, and we do not deny them to themselves. But the world in which we are living is something else again, and there we can see some reason for a talent to look at a proposition in which a bridge contractor is sub-contracting on the bridge under his jurisdiction and turn things down on it, no matter how guileless and pleasant the individual concerned may seem.

Whatever he may have been as a road-builder, Mr. Cox never did conceive of the possibility of sub-contracting, he was not professionally a builder of roads.
