There was a report that Chief French Delegate Alexandre Parodi, who has suggested a compromise to reconcile opposing American and Russian proposals, had received instructions from Paris to support the U. S. plan.

American sources said the U. S. declaration had made it clear it would fight for nothing less than a commission with strong powers to keep vigil over the Balkans.

Hadden Says State Legislation Effective Until June, 1949

Hartford, July 17.—(AP)—Attorney General William L. Hadden said today that the state rent control law passed last year will remain in effect until June 1, 1949.

Reporting that there was "wide-spread confusion and misunderstanding" among tenants and landlords alike, the attorney general in a formal statement declared that enactment by the 1947 Legislature of a state rent control law "placed the tenants in Connecticut in a particularly advantageous position with adequate protection" at least until the close of the 1949 legislative session.

"At that time," he said, "in the event of continuing housing shortages the General Assembly will be in a position to permit further protection for the rent payer."

Under the state law, which becomes effective after the current session of the General Assembly, rents can be increased up to 15 per cent.

"Increases, however," said Hadden, "are only permitted by the decision of properly appointed and qualified state and local commissions from which decisions tenants are given a right of appeal."

 Hartford, July 17—(AP)—Increased use of Hartford as a port of entry for planes on international routes was disclosed today in a report that 19 planes arrived from abroad during the year ending June 30 against only six in the year before.  
 These commercial planes, according to the Federal Immigration Service at Hartford, made Hartford their first stop from overseas to land approximately 525 passengers. Passengers disembarked during the previous fiscal year, numbered about 70.

 The immigration service completed the fiscal year work of examining arrivals from abroad. Included were a few passengers disembarking from freight steamers at New London, New Haven and Bridgeport. Their relatively small number being segregated from air arrivals.  
 Of the more than 500 air passengers represent the number of American citizens. The year before there were 46 alien and 24 citizen. Federal agents examined 1,193 alien crew members arriving by ship and 1,000 American citizens.

ment was demonstrated when, in closed session, they passed the original draft of a resolution section declaring support for "all proper efforts" on the part of the secretary of state to secure peace and freedom throughout the world.

This statement had been approved unanimously by the Resolution group headed by Gov. Lester C. Hunt, Wyoming Democrat.

The defeat portion, in which the governors said they recognized the "abominable character of the burdens" that Marshall is carrying, added that:

"Accordingly, we declare our support for all proper efforts on his part to secure peace and freedom throughout the world and to preserve the liberties, privileges and obligations our way of life to make the same available to all the people of the world."

To some governors, particularly Republicans, this was said to appear too much like a blank check for President Truman and Marshall for a tremendous economic aid program.

The general session also struck the committee-approved resolution a paragraph which alluded to Marshall as a "great soldier, statesman and citizen" who "now carries the heavy burden of defending and promoting this foreign policy and representing the President and the nation in international affairs."

This eliminated any reference, even indirectly, to President Truman. But the governors inserted in a general appreciation resolution a statement of "our faith and confidence" in Marshall and "our deep appreciation for his inspiring address to the conference."

The broad language of the final-approved foreign policy resolution immediately started corridor discussion which resulted in speedy debate by several governors that it bore any "intentional" tinge.

Governor Thomas E. Dewey, New York Republican, W. Preston Lane Jr., Maryland Democrat, Robert Elie, Iowa Republican, and Ralph Gates, Indiana Republican, joined informally in making it clear they believe it constitutes a solid endorsement of the bipartisan foreign policy.

There was discussion among the governors, too, about the overall cost of a foreign assistance program and many said they felt this information must be made available before they could commit themselves finally to any plan.

Stoke Sherlock, Palestine Commission to visit a few Jewish displaced persons camps in Europe before writing its report.

In a series of other resolutions, the governors endorsed universal military training, asking that it be based primarily on facilities of the National Guard.

They called for congressional action to establish army the states' title to mineral-rich lands area. They asked for a continuing study of the separation of the fields of state and Federal taxation.

The conference urged Congress to approve the Senate's action restoring reclamation funds in the states' appropriations bill and asked for "adequate funds" for the states' ever delivered by a chairman of the appropriations subcommittee which handles river development funds, said Mr. Truman added.

"It won't produce results," Taber declared. "There are too many dams started now and they are scattering the work so much that it will take 30 years to finish them."

The appropriations committee, Taber said, does not intend to permit continuing the work on scattered projects. Instead, he added, government engineers should concentrate on projects of the most value.

"You should pick out a big dam on the Missouri river, for example, that will hold two years flow of the

river, and build it quickly. One big dam upstream will protect the cities down the river."

"Cover For Power Projects."

And, while saying he is not an opponent of power development, Taber said Mr. Truman's message looks like "a cover for a lot of power projects" such as the Tennessee Valley authority.

"The best solution will be a Mississippi valley authority. The New York river told us that. Many midwestern members of Congress have been urging development of a Missouri valley authority for years, contending it would be an ideal plan for flood control and power development."

Mr. Truman said his plan does not "change the desirability of the ultimate establishment of valley authorities" but added that they should be built—eventually—but voted no money for them.

radio asserting it was absolutely necessary to create an independent Communist government in what he termed the "free republics."

The broadcast contained no indication that the guerrillas intended to lay down their arms under conditions of current armistice.
