65,000 Comrades In Legion Parade; 750,000 Watching

Pay Tumultuous Tribute to Marchers; New York Mayor Leads Parade Expected to Last More Than 12 Hours; Police Ahead

Washington, Aug. 28.—(AP)—A parade of 65,000 American Legion comrades, the graying ex-soldiers and the younger, jaunty former GIs, paraded up flag-lined Fifth avenue today as hundreds of thousands of spectators paid tumultuous tribute to the men of two World wars.

Police Commissioner Arthur W. Walcott estimated at 2.5 a. m. (e. t.) that the throng along the line of march numbered 750,000. There were an estimated 600,000 persons marching in the Legion's climactic parade, expected to last more than 12 hours over a 2 1/2 mile route.

Mayor William O'Dwyer, a Legionnaire himself and wearing his top hat at a jaunty angle, led the parade at the start behind a mounted police escort. The marchers got under way promptly at 8:30 a. m. (e. t.).

Behind the vanguard were all the colorful units of the Legion's big parades in this state and foreign delegations. Army, Navy and Coast Guard units, a crack detachment of West Point cadets, about 2,000 hand and drum and bugle corps, hundreds of waving flags and banners.

Whitened by Condit uniforms soon were whitened by the showers of confetti, the torn telephone books and newspaper pages deluged on parade.

Thousands watched from windows along canyon Fifth avenue. Thousands cheered from behind the wooden barriers set up by more than 10,000 watch police along the route.

An estimated 200,000 lined the route before the parade began and the great throng swelled each minute. Many were in line hours before the parade began, armed with chairs, stools and box lunches and prepared for a long wait.

O'Dwyer dropped out of the marchers at 42nd street where he joined Gov. Thomas E. Dewey in investigation of the prior theft.
