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To Dry the Skies In Making Rain

Sydney, Sept. 10.—Australia scientists are going to try to dry the skies to make rain. The government's council for scientific and industrial research and the RAAF have planned an experiment for next week using a new method of spraying calcium chloride instead of powdered dry ice into heavy, low-level clouds.

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New GI Policy For Students

Leave Plan Altered to Aid Those Taking Accelerated Program

Hartford, Sept. 10—New leave policies, permitting unbroken sub-sistence payments to veterans attending colleges under the GI Bill and continuing their studies under an accelerated program, have been placed in effect by the Veterans Administration, according to Harry T. Wood, manager of the VA Regional Office in Hartford.

Under these new regulations, veterans will receive subsistence payments for the full enrollment period certified to VA by the educational institution, provided there are no more than 15 days between terms, the manager explained.

"Such leave," he said, "will be charged against the veteran's entitlement."

Further explaining the new policy which went into effect on September 1, Mr. Wood said that the leave will be put on the subsistence rolls from the date of enrollment until 15 days after the close of the period. This will enable the Veterans Administration to make final payments of subsistence allowance without delay to those men who do not return to the following semester.

"No leaves other than the 15-day extension in training status will be authorized by the VA with the exception of the academic leaves offered by the educational institutions to their students," the manager said.

The new leave provisions will not apply to veterans attending their training before the end of the term. In such instances, after the termination of their training, payments will end on the date the training was interrupted.

If the period of a veteran's eligibility ends after the middle of a semester, his eligibility for study will be continued until the end of the semester.

Group of Harvard Savants Plan Study of Parrots

Detroit, Sept. 10—A group of Harvard scientists is planning to study parrots and other talking birds in an attempt to solve the "mystery" of language development in humans.

"It is possible that such experimentation may throw useful light upon the learning, non-learning, of languages and language skills in human beings."

"That babies and birds alike first learn to reproduce the conventional sounds which we call words, not because they can understand or use these words in any ordinary sense, but because these words sound good to them."

"I mean, specifically," he said, "that when a child or a bird is lonely, frightened, hungry, cold, or perhaps merely bored, it can comfort and divert itself by making noises which have previously been associated with comfort and diversion. These noises have become, as it were, sweet music."

Tolland County Products Featured at Eastern States Show

Hartford, Sept. 10—Tolland County, famous for its fine fabrics since early Colonial days, will be represented in the Connecticut building at the post-war renewal of the Eastern State Exposition, Sept. 14 to 20, in West Springfield, Mass., by an exhibit entered by its woolen and worsted manufacturers.

William B. Rogers, chairman of the Tolland County display will be a half-hour technicolor movie depicting the making of woolen and worsted goods. The film will be shown several times daily during the exposition.

Mr. Rogers said "numbness" of colorful fabrics will be found on both sides of a large map on which Tolland County is prominently marked. Among the fabrics used will be men's and women's suitings and cloakings, upholstery and coverings.

Part of the booth will be given over to five original watercolor paintings of typical mill scenes illustrating different phases of the manufacturing process. Wood samples representing various stages of manufacture will supplement the painting display. The entire back wall of the booth will be draped with fabrics in two tones of green matching the prevailing color scheme of the recently redecorated display hall.

The Development Commission has planned a day-long show for the Connecticut building, Rogers stated. Eleven exhibits, including seven by the state departments and commissions, will be open to inspection during the full exposition hours: 1 to 9 p. m. on Sunday, Sept. 14 and 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. thereafter through Saturday, Sept. 20.

Built in 1939, the Connecticut building is the most modern of the five state structures at the 30-year-old exposition which has been closed since 1941 when the Army took over its vast grounds and 44 buildings for use as an ordnance depot. The 1947 show marks the building's fourth year of participation in the big fair.

War Contract Probe Asked
Congressmen Requested To Look Into Recent Increases in Prices

Washington, Sept. 10.—A congressional group investigating war contracts settlements will take a look also at recent increases in the price of oil and gasoline, Representative (R-Ohio) said today.

Bender, chairman of a House Expenditures subcommittee inquiring into contract termination policies, said the members will turn their attention later this week to "what seem to be unauthorized increases in government petroleum contracts."

Bender said Treasury officials have been called to testify Friday on the petroleum contracts. He explained the committee has information that the treasury procurement agency has allowed increases in petroleum contracts in line with price boosts announced recently in large oil companies.

Since the contracts were made before the increases went into effect, Bender said, there is doubt as to the legality of the higher prices and the general accounting office has decided to approve them.

A requisition was made for an investigation of oil price boosts to the government was made by Rep. McCormack (D-Mass.), a committee member. In a letter to Bender, McCormack suggested the group should inquire into the matter.

Japanese General Outlines Defense

Tokyo, Sept. 10.—General Hirota, first of the 20 major war crimes defendants to testify, told the International Tribunal today he retired from public life in 1940 because he feared the consequences after Japan joined Germany and Italy in the tripartite pact.

In a 20,000-word deposition the 70-year-old Hirota, twice minister of war and a member of four cabinets, said his decision to retire was based on a "discussion" with the late Prince Fumimaro Koyama, three times premier.

He said whatever the army did in Manchuria and China after he took office as war minister 90 days after the Mukden incident of Sept. 18, 1931, was in direct response to policies laid down by the cabinet in Tokyo. He indicated he had never heard of the Japanese army operating except with cabinet approval—a view directly opposite to that taken by many of the defendants who said no military posts.

Asked also how that he devoted much thought to world peace, he had prepared a plan for joint U. S.-British-Japanese action which he averred would have replaced the "medieval" League of Nations and preserved the world against unrest.

Rebels Blow Up Bridges

Athens, Sept. 10.—Press reports from Salonika today said a group of rebels opposed to the Yugoslav regime of Premier Marinkovic had blown up bridges and mining roads in operations against Tito's forces inside Yugoslavia.

The dispatches said the rebels, calling themselves "crusaders," were operating in the Lake Doiran region, where the Bulgarian, Yugoslav and Greek borders meet.

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Surprise Seen At Acquittal

Nuremberg, Germany, Sept. 10.—War crimes attorneys said today that yesterday's acquittal of Otto Skorzeny and his seven aides on war crimes charges may lead to a re-writing of the laws of war.

A court of American colonels at Dachau ruled the giant SS (Elite Guard) officer—described by some Americans as a "Don Quixote of war"—and his mates innocent of crime when they infiltrated U. S. lines during the Battle of the Bulge in 1944 and spread havoc while wearing American uniforms.

"It was incredible," Col. A. J. Rosenfeld, Skorzeny's prosecutor, said of the verdict. "There is much more to it and it will have legal consequences."

Surprised at Acquittal
High-ranking attorneys in war crimes cases here, although not surprised at the acquittal, said Rosenfeld's remark was valid. One of them, who asked not to be identified by name, said he believed the court may have used this line of reasoning.

Skorzeny, whose first turn under the world spotlight came when he kidnaped Elveto Mussolini from the Allies at Adolf Hitler's command, and his men wore the uniforms of the so many in battle. They admitted it. The Geneva convention, the basis of all laws of war, forbids that.

Devised to Be Spies
Men caught wearing the uniform of the enemy are deemed to be spies and may be shot on the spot. But Skorzeny and his men were not caught red-handed. And the Geneva convention does not clearly charge that contingency, the attorneys said.

Therefore, the crux of the situation seems to be not what you do, but what you get caught doing. As a result, some of the attorneys here said the whole body of the laws of war needs revision, unless the principle is adopted that the victors lay down the rules.
