Oldest in Point of Service in Manchester 42 Years at Work
 Joseph F. McVeigh of 26 Washworth street, for 42 years a letter carrier connected with the Manchester post office, has tendered his resignation to the department. McVeigh is the oldest letter carrier in point of service in the town of Manchester.
 When the free delivery mail was first instituted in the South Manchester Post Office under Postmaster W. B. Cheney, Mr. McVeigh was one of the four men qualified for a position of carrier. Because of his age he was not named when the first three men started, but after the service had been in effect for a short time and it was seen that a letter carrier was necessary Mr. McVeigh started as a regular carrier.
 Under the postal rules he would have retired at the age of 62 and his resignation was accepted by the department. Mr. McVeigh is only 61 years old and his application for retirement under the postal rules were not the intended result of his resignation.
 He has always covered the west side of the town in his duties as a letter carrier. He has been interested in matters pertaining to the town's history and his personal contact with many of the people for the last 42 years has made him one of the best informed men in town on town history, places, and events.

Still Argue Primary Case

Legal Opinion Sought in Write-In Poll; Recall Previous Tiff
 It was learned today that legal opinion is being sought on the problem posed Primary Day when Charles S. Murphy and Fred Battigiani, Democrats, were written in for nominations, and were declared nominated to posts left blank on the machine.
 It has been asserted that writing in primaries are not permissible in that local regulation requires the filing of regularly signed proposals for nomination in the party contests. Others claim this procedure only assures candidates a place on the machine, and that it is no bar to write-in, made in the same manner as at election of officials. Manchester's primary voting, it is set out, is carried on in the same manner as election voting.
 If the present procedure is incorrect, then the procedure of past years also might be attacked, for William F. Veterans' Head Backs Training

Says It's Impossible to Obtain Congressional Approval at Present
 Washington, Sept. 11.—Ray Sawyer, national commander of the Amvets, said today that what he called the failure of the army to improve military justice has made it "virtually impossible" to obtain Congressional approval of a universal military training program.
 "The high command," Sawyer said in a statement, "is still prone to protect and whitewash fellow troops while GI's—the men in the ranks—are subjected to an autocratic system of regulations, government and punishment."
 The veterans organization headed by Sawyer has endorsed passage of universal training legislation. Sawyer said the Amvets have concluded, however, that "it is virtually impossible to see it to Congressional approval at present."
 "It is time," he added, "for the brass hats to determine whether they want to continue with pomp and circumstance or whether they want to serve on courts martial."
 Sawyer said the Amvets executive committee proposes that:
 1. Enlisted men be permitted to serve on courts martial.
 2. The inspector general and judge advocate general of the army be "completely removed" from control of high officers in their branch of service, reporting directly to the secretary of war.
 3. Civilians be made eligible to hold either of these posts by presidential appointment subject to Senate confirmation.

17 Year Old Bride Slain

Husband Admits the Murder; Had Been Married Three Weeks
 Denver, Sept. 11.—A 17-year-old bride of three weeks was shot and killed last night by her student husband, police said, while her younger sister looked on.
 The bride was identified by Police Captain Lou C. Morton as Mrs. Gertrude (Sue) Geiser.
 Detective Sergeant Arthur Shottwell said the husband, Charles E. Geiser, Jr., 23, a University of Denver student from New Mexico, signed a written statement admitting he shot his wife five times.
 Raymond E. Barba of the district attorney's office said murder charges would be filed against Geiser.
 Shottwell said Geiser, who remained "calm and collected," told his story in his statement.
 The couple were married Aug. 22 after a brief courtship. They lived as man and wife only three days after which they took up separate residences. They had talked of dissolving their marriage and yesterday morning Geiser consulted an attorney about his bride obtaining an annulment.
 Yesterday afternoon he went to his wife's apartment to make plans to visit the attorney.
 They sat talking and finally made some heated remarks to each other. Geiser started to stare at the blue dress she was wearing the same one which she wore at the wedding. He became angered and began shouting.
 "Thinking of the marriage ceremony, 'until death do us part,' he fired one shot into her as he repeated each word of the phrase. Then he told her horrified younger sister, Sylvia Mc-Nabb, 14, to call the police.

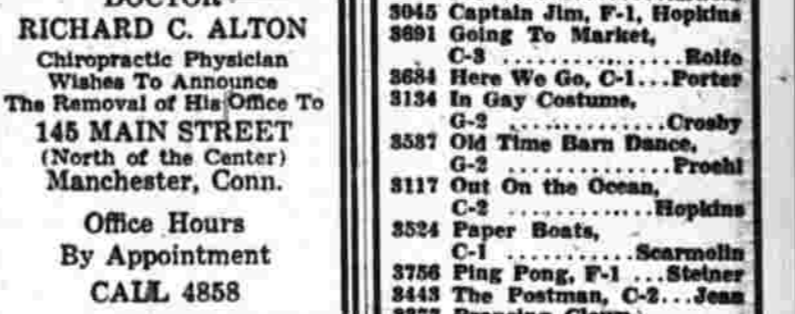
