Washington, Nov. 14.-(A) -Rep. John D. Lodge (R., Conn.), predicted today that Communists will attempt a coup in Italy next March to be synchronized with a general strike in France. He said success of such a move in Italy would lead to the loss of Greece, Turkey and the Middle East to the Communists.
