According to the best informa-tion available here, however, a buying splurge would not neces-sarily indicate a state of panic or an economic crisis, although it might reflect popular nervousness and an unsteady public confidence. Such rumors have cropped up before in Moscow. There was whis-pered talk about currency during the Council of Foreign Ministers meeting there last spuing—talk of a possible change in foreign ex-change valuation.

change valuation. This time the rumors appear to have had a greater effect on the population. Whether they are true or not-whether any change ac-tually has been planned in curren-tually has been planned in currency-remains the secret of the Kremlin until and if it is ready to

act. Among authorities familiar with the Soviet economy, the money problem of the Russians is said to be one of currency surplus. Peo-ple have more rubles than there are goods to buy. It is this fact which has given at least a tinge of validity to the rumors. A curren-cy change would be one way of draining off the excess from mil-lions of pocket books and to some extent of levelling out as well as extent of levelling out as well as reducing available buying power. However the stiuation may turn out, it has had no perceptible ef-fect on the Council of Foreign
