"Do I Not Destroy Them?"
 No amount of pleading on the part of those who were more conscious of the superficial dignity of the office of President Lincoln than of the more substantial perhaps, of its real basic dignity -- was ever able to persuade Abraham Lincoln out of his habit of meeting the people directly in his own office. They would crowd in upon him, with their diverse problems. And while one petitioner or another would be the recipient of the President's consideration of a case, there was little or no privacy. Those elements of his duty which dealt directly with the affairs of his nation the President conducted in the full view of the people themselves.

Such a Presidential office scene was, one day, the setting for one of those remarks which revealed his spiritual greatness, which was, of course, his whole greatness. The problem at the President's desk concerned treatment of a former Confederate soldier. The President was being sympathetic. After all, he observed, the enemies of the Union were human beings, were they not? Even in war one could not remember that. Even in war one could not be completely re-merciless.

It was at this point that a member of the usual audience, waiting, written as he was, at the President's desk, challenged the President's thought. It was an elderly woman who spoke. She spoke nothing but the normal thing. And if her normal approach now seems somewhat inferior and even reprehensible in the light of Lincoln's reply, we had best remember, with some of Lincoln's own character, that she herself may have been under unusual strain -- perhaps owing to the loss of sons to the enemy of whom the President was speaking in such mild and reasonable terms. Perhaps it was her personal anguish and tragedy which made her cry out, and demand of the President's courtesy how he could speak kindly of his enemies when it was rather his duty to destroy them.

It is at this point that the first direct conversation of the incident has been preserved. "What, madam?" asked Lincoln slowly. "Do I not destroy them when I make them my friends?"

Years later, Leo Tolstoy, the Russian novelist, encountered the world-wide myth of a leader who was big and great enough to consider that he was "destroying" his enemies if and when he could make them his friends.

Carl Sandburg tells the story: "Traveling in the Caucasus, Tolstoy happened to be the guest of a Circassian tribal chief, a devout Moslem who lived in the mountains far from civilized life, with vague and childish understanding of the outside world. He received Tolstoy with the best of food and drink, after the usual asking his guest to talk him about the outside world, listening with no particular interest till Tolstoy spoke of great statesmen and great generals. Then the tribal chief called in neighbors and sons to listen, wild-looking riders, some of the wilder ones seated on horse and looking up with hunger for knowledge. Tolstoy talked about Russian wars and their victories, about foreign rulers and generals. As he hoped so they wanted more details, asked how his hands looked, how tall he was, who made his guns

and pistols, the color of Napoleon's horse. Tolstoy said his best, but could hardly satisfy them when he had told all he knew about Napoleon. Then the chief, a tall, gray-bearded rider, smelling of leather and horses and the earth itself, arose and said very gravely: "But you have not told us a syllable about the greatest general and greatest ruler of the world, the man who was stronger as the rock and as sweet as the fragrance of roses. The angels appeared to his mother and predicted that the son whom she would conceive would become the greatest of the stars had ever seen. He was so great that he even forgave the crimes of his greatest enemies and shook brotherly hands with those who had plotted against his life. "His name was Lincoln and the country in which he lived is called America, which is no far away that if a youth should journey to reach it he would be an old man when he arrived. Tell of us that man."
