The climax to this attitude came on last Thursday, when Secretary of State Marshall, planning for the Inter-American conference at Bogota, that conference had come close to failure from the point of view of United States policy.

This was supposed to be the climactic gesture of American goodwill and friendship at the conference.

The reading of the message received not a single sound of applause from the conference, the most marked sign it was possible for the conference to deliver.

What did this mean? Well, it meant some surface, petty things, and it illustrated some deeper issues as well.

According to some observers, it merely meant that our "Neighbors considered the aid figure low, in consideration of what we are sending to Europe.

According to others, it reflected the crudity of American methods in making such an obvious play for the applause which was withheld.

Basically, we think, it illustrated the truth, which is that you can't buy good neighbors with dollars alone. When a relationship is on such a basis, there is never satisfaction with the price.

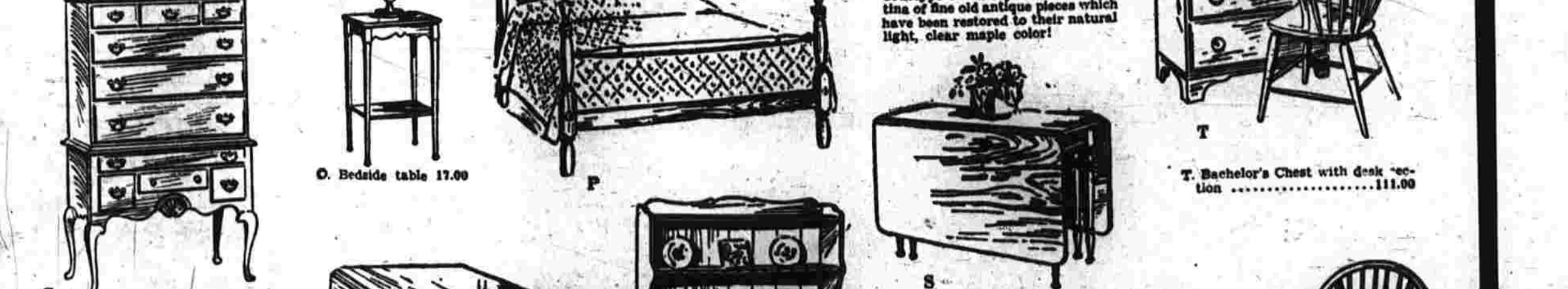
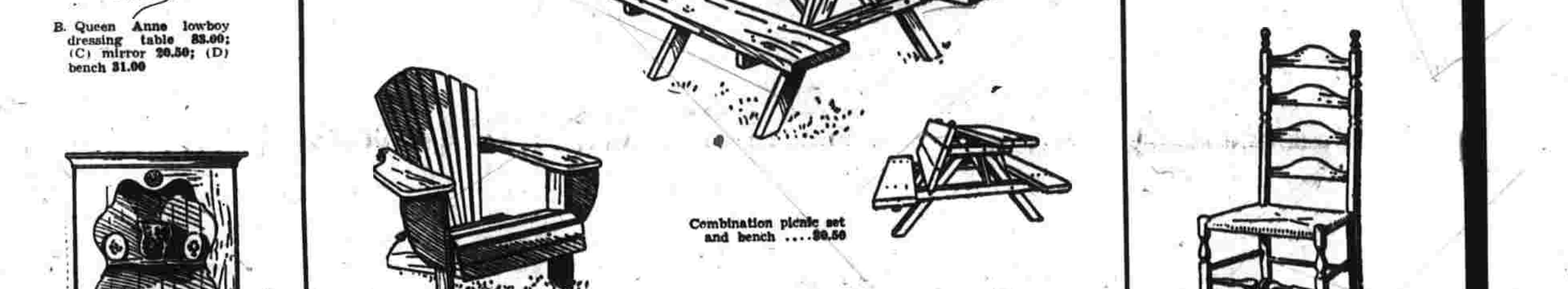
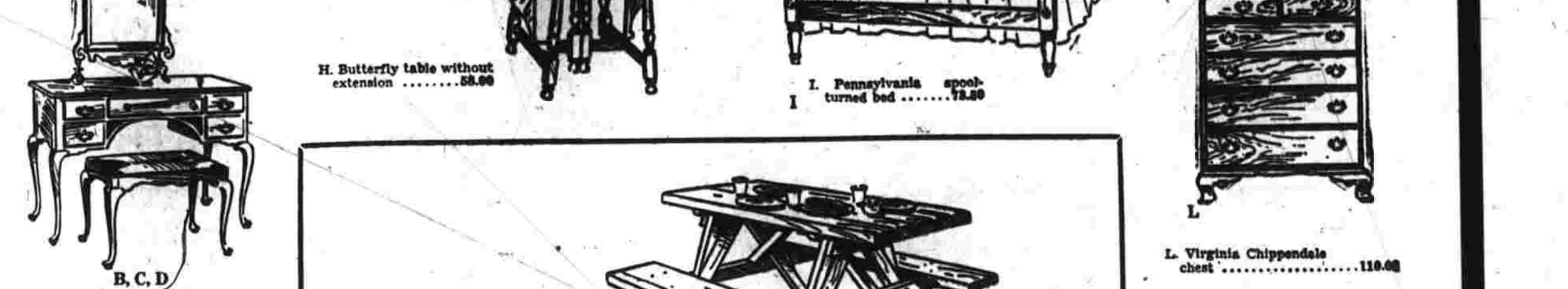
