State Opens Berard Trial

First Witnesses Called To Testify in First Degree Murder Case

New Haven, April 22—(AP)—The state called its first witnesses today in the first degree murder trial of Albert L. Berard, 33, of Meriden.

First to be called to the stand in Superior court to testify before a jury completed yesterday was Clarence A. Carpenter, assistant city engineer of Meriden.

Awaiting to follow him were Raymond Frederick, Meriden photographer, and State Police Officer Wendell H. Tatro.

State's Attorney Abraham S. Ullman said the trial called to give technical testimony as to the location of the scene of the slaying and describe various photographs would be on the stand the greater part of the day.

Will Deane, Bureau chief, indicated that the state's testimony largely would duplicate that given last December in the trial of James O. Butera, 29, of Meriden, identified by the state as Berard's partner in an attempt to commit a burglary at the W. T. Great company store in Meriden in October, 1946.

James A. Leach, 31, assistant manager of the store, was shot and killed.

Butera, convicted of first degree murder and given the mandatory death sentence, now is awaiting the outcome of his appeal to the State Supreme court.

Hartford, April 22—(AP)—The Connecticut State Medical Society, opening its 126th annual convention here today, is going ahead with the formation of a non-profit, pre-paid medical care plan.

packing food and clothing for shipment to the Holy Land. Shortly after the arrest, a woman who authorities said identified the captured arms as being those of the late Arthur Untermyer, wife of Louis Untermyer, went to the police station where she said she was influenced by my activities.

She said she is national treasurer of the American League for a Free Palestine.

"I was influenced by my participation in the fight for liberation of the Holy Land in Palestine and it is a crime, which I don't believe in. I would be happy to serve whatever penalty he might receive."

The store of seized arms included 100 rifles, about 100 revolvers, a few grenades and various ammunition and bayonets.

The raid was touched off by the district director of the building.

The building, police said, is occupied by the importers of general merchandise. Officers quoted the captured arms as saying they were using the loft to pack food and clothing for Palestine.

The raid was a member of the Bondsvitch firm.

Search of the building, which began yesterday, was continued today. Federal Bureau of Investigation agents were called into the case immediately after the discovery of the cache.

Ceremonial to Attract Big Crowd; Stunts To Be a Feature

Nutmeg Forest, Tall Cedars of Lebanon, and a Spicing Ceremony Saturday, May 1, is the feature of the ceremonial to be held at the Cedars parade along Main street, leaving the terminus at 6 o'clock. This is the first of the parade and more than 50 candidates or "stunts" will be in the parade on various types of costumes. Other features will be announced in Friday's paper.

Walter Hadden, Past Grand Tall Cedars and present member of the Supreme Council, Extension Committee, and his committee include William Forbes and Gus Peterson in charge of the parade; Jack Gordon, Entertainment; Frank Sweet in charge of the supper; James Lewis and Ray Norris in charge of the refreshments; and Fred Knoke and John Fox.

Arabs Move Into Jericho; Claims Differ

The Prophet Joshua in Biblical times, lies 20 miles west of Amman, Trans-Jordan. Major James Bullis said he would personally lead the Army of Trans-Jordan, Syria, Iraq and Lebanon to Palestine this week to fight Zionism.

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Four Jews were reported killed in the Jericho region yesterday, bringing the death toll to 100. United Nations report Nov. 29, 1947, that 1,215 Jews, 1,800 Arabs, 171 British, four Americans and 30 other persons.

The British blew up an evacuated Jewish school in the Moshe quarter of Jerusalem, near the Palestine government's information center. The British said the school had been used as a Jewish weapons' depot, but this was denied by Haganah.

The Jewish Agency spokesman accused King Abdullah of Palestine of "aggression" in Palestine. He said that information had been received that members of the Trans-Jordanian legion had been assigned to secure Alhady bridge.

King Abdullah told the Associated Press at the capital in Amman that the Jews, which occupied Jericho, less than 20 miles northeast of Jerusalem, was composed of "a scout troops which always precede the regular Army."

Contradiction of British statement was a contradiction of British statement which said yesterday that members of the British-trained Arab Legion in Jericho consisted of one company under British Army orders assigned to secure Alhady bridge.

Gunfire shattered Jerusalem's early morning stillness. Bullets apparently coming from a nearby Jewish quarter struck the public information building. There were no casualties.

Eight trucks rolled out of Jerusalem at dawn, carrying British officials to Lydda airport for the trip home to England. Only a skeleton crew of 20 British officials remains in the Holy City; rear guard of those who enforced Britain's mandate, which is to be withdrawn May 15.

The Town Vote May 5th
 A week from today, Wednesday, May 5th, the voters of Manchester are being asked to decide, on the voting machines at the State Armory, the question of whether or not to approve a plan for creating additional voting districts in Manchester.

This voting will be the first referendum on a public question conducted under the new town charter. The issue to be determined is important.

It is, unfortunately, more important than a simple issue of whether or not Manchester should proceed to divide itself up into several voting districts. That issue has been answered by saying that if Manchester does keep on growing, there is likely to come a time when the present system of voting will cease being as satisfactory as it is now, and the creation of several voting districts will be necessary, and agreed upon by all.

That, however, is not the clean issue for the voting on May 5th. The issue to be decided then is not only the question of whether or not we should have more than one voting district, but also the question of whether we approve the district lines drawn in the specific plan backed by the petition which has obtained this referendum.

We are to vote, on May 5th, not only on the principle, but upon a specific blueprint for the establishment of four voting districts.

Whatever one may think of the principle, the blueprint is the poorest possible solution of the problem, it attempts to solve.

The lines drawn, taken in reference to available polling places, defeat their only respectable objective, which is to make voting more convenient for the people of Manchester. These lines will, if established, have exactly the opposite result in so many cases that common sense dictates that we reject them.

The lines are drawn to cut Manchester, like a pie, into four quarters, each narrowing to a point at the Center, each expanding to great width at the town borders.

This happens to be the way most of us would divide Manchester into four pieces, if called upon to do it quickly, and without too much thought for the purposes of such a division, and we suppose that is the way it has happened that this proposal is the proposal it is.

The purpose, however, in convenience in voting. The idea is to give more Manchester people less of a distance to travel in order to vote.

Under the proposal which we are being asked to approve next Wednesday, thousands of Manchester people living within a stone's throw of the present polling places at the State Armory will be compelled to travel out to Manchester Green school. Most of the population in the north end district, as a matter of fact, will find that the supposed convenience of proposed new voting system does not exist for them.

A good many voters in the other proposed three districts will likewise find that the new voting plan places them no closer to their polling place than they are now.
