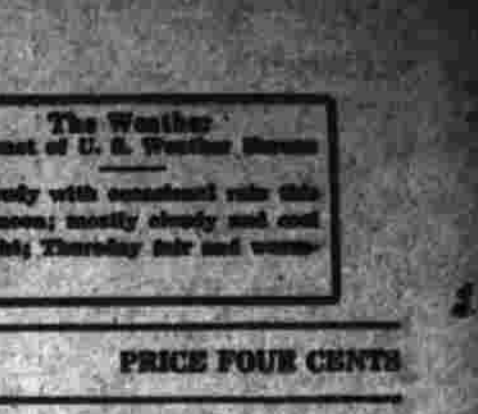

Hartford, May 5.—(P)—An extra \$40,500 for construction of an alcoholic clinic in Hartford was granted today by the State Finance Advisory committee.

This sum, to cover "unforeseen costs" for foundation work caused by poor soil conditions, will be added to the \$1,000,000 originally allotted for the clinic and hospital, to be built on Loper street, will be the first state institution devoted exclusively to care and treatment of alcoholics. ### Suit Settled Out of Court

#### Action Against Estate Of Derby Physician; Final Approval Needed

New Haven, May 5.—Settlement of a \$200,000 suit by Angelle Brink, of New Haven, against the estate of the late Dr. Royal W. Finney, Derby physician, was effected yesterday just as the case was scheduled for trial in superior court.

The amount of the settlement, reportedly \$170,000, must be approved by the Derby probate court before it becomes final, one of the attorneys connected with the case said today.

Mrs. Brink claimed that she had been employed by Dr. Finney on Sept. 1, 1939 as a nurse, summer months, at a salary of \$50 per month, with the understanding that she would receive a legacy in the physician's will in the amount of \$200,000.

The plaintiff alleged in her complaint that she continued to work for him until May 1, 1941, receiving monthly payments of \$200, at which time Dr. Finney requested her to marry him. She declined accepting the proposal, she stated in her complaint, for some time and meanwhile left the physician's home to enter a hospital for an operation.

Shortly thereafter Dr. Finney died, upon her release from the hospital, she claimed, she attempted to resume her employment and was prevented from doing so by the employe of the physician until September, 1945. and to adopt the reactionary principle of party regularity as a test of "Republicanism." He added: "There is not a single senator among the self-labeled progressives who campaigned as hard outside of their own states, for Dewey in 1944 or for Republican senators in 1946 as I did. I am highly amused when some of these self-appointed progressives talk about working for progressive principles within the party."

Baldwin, advised of Morse's remarks, said: "I have no desire to engage in a public controversy with Senator Morse. He has declined further comment."

There has never been a formal announcement of the group's organization. But members let it be known they planned to get together to fight any convention action which might label the O. O. F. as either "reactionary" or "isolationist."

After Monday night's meeting, Baldwin met all inquiries with the assertion "we won't talk" and "no comment."

Those at the dinner Baldwin gave were Senators Knowland (Calif.), Eves (N. Y.), Gurney (S. D.), Ballston-Bellett (Main), Smith (N. J.), Tye (Minn.), Flanders (Vt.) and Lodge (Mass.).

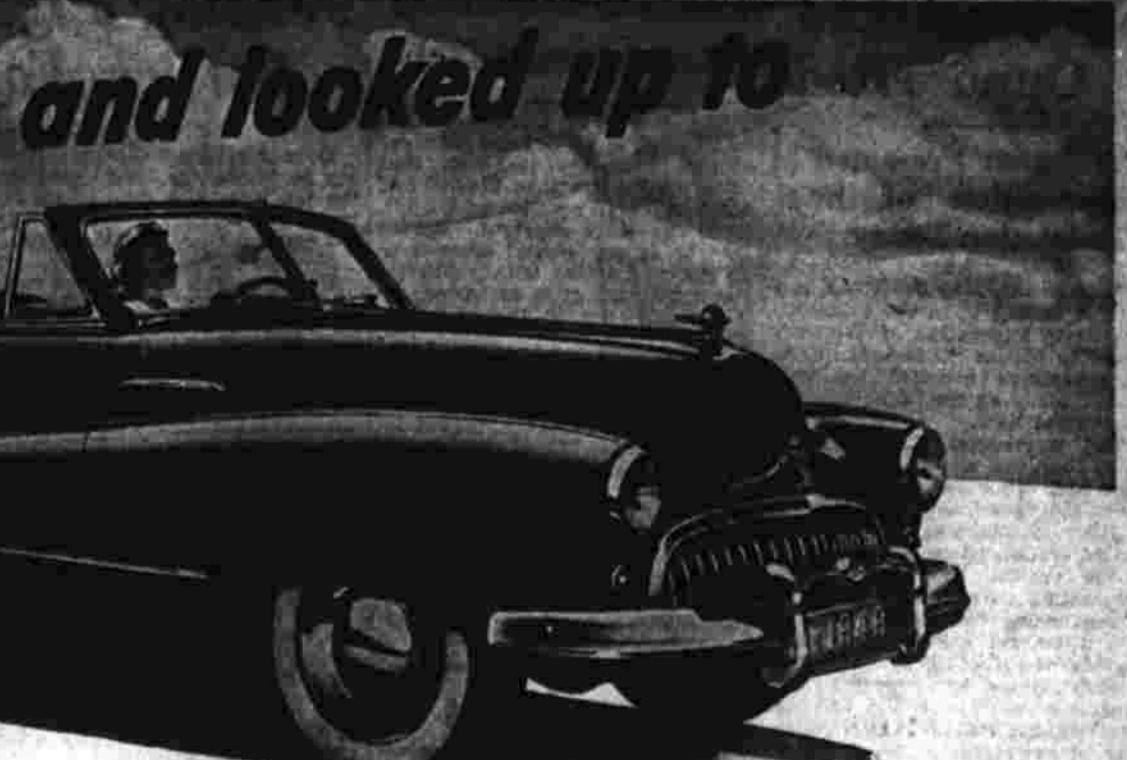
