





Seven in Action
On the ground, the United States has only eight divisions in the Far East, seven of them i action in Korea.

There is nothing to indicate an intention to increase the number of ground units there. That force apparently is considered adequate to hold the line across Korea until a truce is reached or to turn new tactics if it isn't. Moreover, reasons other than tactical quite possibly may under-lie such policy. The broad plan now appears to be a buildup of strategic reserve forces at home rather than a continued expansion of ground forces in theater chosen by Moscow.

As in the Far East, there is no present indication of an additional boost of American ground force strength, by units, in Europe. There the equivalent of six U. S. divisions are deployed as part of

Two of those divisions are National Guard organizations — the 43rd of New England and the 28th of Pennsylvanis. During the months ahead a substantial part of the present personnel of those two divisions will head back for the United States. That is be-cause their 24-month federal servtee will be completed and they will be eligible for release from duty in the state divisions which were federalized in 1850.
