Legal Exemptions

By FASES MARLOW

Washington, Jan. 30—45 For each exemption you can legally claim you knock \$600 off your income before the rest is taxable.

There are various exemptions and rules covering them: Husbands, wives, dependents, blind people, people \$5 or over, and people who were born or died in 1951.

Husbands and Wives

Everyone with \$600 or more income last year must file a return. And everyone who does so gets a \$600 exemption for himself.

A wife is not considered a dependent. If she had no income, and you file a return but she doesn't, you claim an exemption for her.
