Lisbon, Portugal, Feb. 22-(/P)—The 14 Atlantic Allies formally endorsed today the creation of a European de-fense army including German soldiers. The vote was unani-mous in a historic full dress North Atlantic council meet-ing

By this action the council voted to bring an indefinite number divisions from the West German Republic into a six nation army of two mil-lion men for defense of west-ern Europe against possible Communist aggression. Now the six nations—France, Germany, Italy, Belgium, The Netherlands and Luxembourg— can move swiftly toward signs-ture of a treaty paving the way for the army. Ratification by the parliament of each nation must take place be-fore the recruiting of Germans into the army can begin.
