

The Treasury, however, the board's withdrawal will com-plicate government financing. A major task for the Treasury dur-ing 1952 will be to borrow about 10 billion dollars from private capital to help finance the defense program program. In a statement prepared for the subcommittee today, Snyder said: "It is my present intention to recommend to the President that he consider the creation of a na-tional council with advisory tional council . . . with advisory authority in the area of monetary and fiscal policy." He asked the subcommittee for s views on such a step. He said the council could "do much to achieve accord before discord arises" and keep the President in-formed on broad economic issues. The group, he said, could be com-posed of the Secretary of the Treasury, the Budget Director and Chairmen of the Federal Reserve Board, the President's Council of weight to the inflationary implica-tions of our large defense program and of the deficit financing operaions which will have to be undertaken in connection with it.", Snyder said he favors keeping the Federal Reserve board independent and working closely with the Treasury. 
