

However, I feet there were a few points not mentioned which should be brought to the attention of every subscriber as it means an additional unnecessary expense to many who will not gain anything from this service.

It would seem that rather than saying the Manchester Exchange will be enlarged, it would be much more truthful to say additional phones are being funnelled into Hartford, yet exchanges within the Hartford area are not permitted toll free service between exchanges. For instance Glaston-bury is able to call Hartford toll free, as will Manchester if the service is accepted, yet Glaston-bury and Manchester will still have to pay toll service between the two towns. Hartford is ten miles from Manchester Glaston-bury is next-door—yet to one we may call toll free and the other must be paid for with an additional charge.




