been done to steelmaking danili In the past, steel comparises have taken two and three days to complete an orderly shutdown process. The current strike seems destined to do the job in well under 24 hours.

Picketing was orderly everywhere after one or two scuffles and window breaking which marked the excitement at the strike's start last night.

The first unemployment in al-The first unemployment in al-lied industry was reported by U. S. Steel which said all its coal miners had been furloughed. At Pittsburgh, a spokesman for the U. S. Steel Corp. said: "We're 100 per cent down so fa as steel-making is concerned. All of our coal mines are down. We're working on the proper banking of our blast furnaces. We're still ne-gotiating for help from the union to accomplish this and getting some spotty co-operation in some places."

"Big Steel," producer of one third the nation's steel, employs some 14,500 coal miners in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Kentucky. All the coal they mine is used in the steelmaking process.

Joseph P. Molony, USW director in Buffalo. N. Y., said the walkout in his area "was sur-
