In October, 1922, following the first nationwide sale of Poppies by the V.F.W., the American Le-gion Convention repudiated the Daisy as its official flower, and again adopted the Poppy.

In the spring of 1923, the American Legion conducted its first nationwide sale of Poppies made by a French manufacturer. In 1923, the Veterans of Foreign Wars evolved the idea which resulted in the V.F.W. "Buddy" Poppy—fashioned by disabled and needy veterans, who were paid for their work in assembling

In February, 1924, the V.F.W. registered the name "Buddy" Poppy with the U.S. Patent Office, and still holds all trade-mark rights in the name "Buddy" under the classification of artificial

HISTORY OF ANDERSON-SHEA POST NO. 2046, VETERANS OF FOREIGN

WARS OF THE UNITED STATES Anderson-Shea Post No. 2046, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States, was officially instituted on March 18, 1931 at a public ceremony in the State Armory, Sixty-two charter members were obligated at that meeting by Past Department Commander James F. Daly of Hartford. Archie Kilpatrick was the first Post Commander.

The ground work for the formation of the Post was made in a series of meetings under the direc-tion of J. Andrew Holzheimer, a resident of Manchester, but then a member of the Caldwell Colt. Robinson Post of Hartford. The names of two local soldiers were selected to be memorialized in the naming of the Post, Ernest G. Anderson and William L. Shea. Both of

these local men made the supreme sacrifice in World War I. For several years the Post held meetings in the State Armory, Eventually the officers of the Post secured the former Loomis Homestead on Middle Turnpike for a home and members aided in remodeling the structure into a suitable home for the Post and Auxiliary. The units occupied this home for several years until it was destroyed by fire

Plans were made for the construction of the new home and the contract for its building was awarded to Alexander Jarvis. The new home was officially opened to members in 1945. JOSEPH A. STERLING, Commander




