



Why? Because although the Tower has shown no cangerous new tilt lately, normal deterioration is expected to bring it tumbling down in about 150 years unless new restoration work is done. However, for the present it is as safe as the Tower has been in years. Reports had circulated in the Italian press, after the recent North Italy floods that the Tower had tilted further to a dangerous spoint.

No Immediate Danger No Immediate Danger

"The old and solid tower is in no immediate danger of collapsing," said Dr. I. Noccioli, surveyor who daily checks the delicate seismographs and inclinometers inside the tower.

Some years ago, an extensive survey was made of the ground on which the Tower is built. The conclusion was that there is no danger that the Tower, whose foundations were laid in 1174, would collapse for 150 years.
