A total of \$128,652 was turne over to Manchester Hospital b connecticut Blue Cross during th irst six months of this year, ad ording to an announcement b obert Parnali, general manager of the non-profit statewide hospit.

The payments represent the hos-pital's share in the total of \$8,021.paid out by the Connecticut a, which now has more than a lion members, for hospital care dered to Manchester area memters of the plan. This is the highest total for any

Retirement Fund Pays 15 Pensions

The town's Retirement Allow ance Fund has paid out \$14,170.99 a pensions to 15 former town mployes, according to Town freasurer Leroy Norris' monthly

The report shows that the fund, which has a total membership of 150, has receipts totalling \$115,-035.72, as of Aug. 7. It started off the year with a balance of \$49,-753.69 and has received \$23,319.53 in employes' contributions, the an-nual \$36,150 appropriation from the town and \$5,812.50 in interest on government bonds. The fund now has \$255,000 in Government bonds.
