Dr. William H. Upson, president of the Hartford County Medical Association, pointed out that the entire tongue becomes red and in a day or two the flat red points shift to the neck and over the rest of the body.

He said, "Scarlet fever and streptococcal or septic sore throat are of the same family—one pro-

are of the same family—one pro-duces a bright red rash and the other an irritating sore throat." Dr. Upson added that peeling usually follows the rash two weeks

later and may last for three weeks. EAT ANYTHING WITH In some mild cases the rash may be gone in four to eight hours.

Scarlet fever is spread through discharges from the mouth or nose of those stricken with the disease, through floor dust or through contaminated milk or food. Its after-effects may leave the victim with ear trouble, infected glands or heart and kidney disorders. At the first sign of the disease the family physician should be called in at once!

This election is important, the issues are tremendous but God has a way of interfering in the affairs of men that can better be perceived from the vantage point of history."


