

Although the budget total won't be announced officially until Tru-man sends it to the capitol, there has been speculation the spending estimate is around 80 billion dollars.

Eisenhower has been kept informed of the outgoing edminis-tration's budget planning through reports submitted to him by De-troit banker Joseph M. Dodge, the general's pre-inauguration representative in the budget bureau.

Those reports are the basis for the confidence of Eisenhower sides that some cuts can be made. But, as GOP congressional leaders also have stated, they feel there prob-ably will be no substantial reduc-tions in federal spending until the fiscal year starting July 1, 1954. 

Cheney Brothers' 1,600 employes will have to take what amounts to 10% cents an hour wage cut starting Monday. In a decision received by company and union officials this morning, Professor John A. Hogan of the University of New Hampshire, who arbitrated the dis-puts said that all hourly rates and base rates shall be reduced by 3%, cents an hour, with piece rates and plant hiring minimum rates being adjusted accordingly. His award size held that there will be a one cent cost of living roll back, thereby reducing the current cost-of-living allowance from seven to six cents an hour. In authorizing the 9.3-4 cent an hour wage cut, Hogan awarded the company the full wage reduction it had requested in September. Local 63, Textile Workers Union of Americs, had refused to accept
