





Doctor Says

Penticides Used On Foodstuffs
Are Possible Danger To Health

By Edwin P. Jordan, M.D.

No one needs to be told that the food we eat is important to the maintenance of health. In recent years a whole new set of problems

Briefly, these may be considered to be the effects of artificial fer-tilizers on the foods raised in soil so treated, the effects of dusts or sprays aimed at animal or vege-table pests, fungi or weeds, and finally, the influence on the body of chemicals added to foods to

these things in a brief newspaper column, and it must be confessed that the answers to many ques-tions raised on these subjects are not known.

Some people feel, for example, that the artificial fertilizers may have a serious effect on the health

of the nation, through altering the food products grown under such There is, however, little definite evidence that the effect is either harmful or healthful, and until the information, there is not much we can do about it. Personally, I am

can do about it. Personally, I am not unduly alarmed.

With regard to the substances used to attack insects and other pests on food-hearing plants or animals, it has been recognized that hazards are created. Two of the scientific councils of the American Medical Association have been interested in this subject, as have other organizations.

It is recognized that when pesticides are poisonous to insects they are usually poisonous to man. They are less poisonous to human beings than to insects, of course, but pesticides carry possible dangers to those who come into direct contact with them. Every effort

contact with them. Every effort should be made to keep the amount which is eaten with the food down to the lowest possible level.

In closing an editorial discus-sion of this subject in the Journal of the American Medical Associaof the American Medical Associa-tion it was said:

"Now physicians ask that foods be free from toxic residues of pesticides..." This is a subject that requires continued study and in which the efforts of all should be engaged in order to guard our foodstuffs from dangerous con-tamination.

Another enormous question relates to the addition of chemicals to various foodstuffs. Work on this subject is also going forward under the auspices of many agencies. In closing a report on this subject, for example, the Council on Foods and Nutrition said:

"Intentional chemical additives, especially those likely to find their way into basic foodstuffs or to find widespread application in a variety of foods, each of which may be of foods, each of which may be infrequently eaten, must not be permitted until the complete harmlessness of these agents can be demonstrated beyond reasonable doubt.
