

# Harry Benson Dies, Official at Cheney's Democrats End House Ike Plans 8.5 Billion Slash

Harry B. Benson, 54, of 192 Hartford road, vice president of Cheney Brothers and one of this town's leading citizens, died at 10:20 this morning at Manchester Memorial lospital.

His attending physician, Dr. A. Elmer Diskan, said his death fol-iowed a long illness. Mr. Benson had entered the local hospital for repeated check-ups, the last admission being on April 13. Leading officials at Cheney's, upon learning of Benson's death, issued statements. Among them are Henry R. Mallory, executive vice president and treasurer; Frank D. Cheney, chairman of the board; and Ward Cheney, presi-
