

Full Membership of Fire "Company No. 5" Schiebel Bros., a machine shop and wholesale automotive parts distributing outfit located at 8 Proctor Rd., probably has more volunteer firemen per square foot than any place else in town, out-alde of a firehouse on a nocial night. Of the 10 men working there, four, including partners Al Schle-bel and Elmore "Binky" Hohen-thal, are volunteers. Al and Binky, along with Kenneth Smith, are members of Hook and Ladder Co. No. 1 located at the corner of Pine Street and Hartford Road, while Fred Smith, Ken's brother, is a Fred Smith, Ken's brother, is a North End firefighter. Together, the four have piled up an accumulated 85 years of fire-fighting service—the partners each have 25 years, Ken Smith 23 and Fred Smith a mere 12—and in those years have sped to uncounted thousands of grass fires, brush fires, oil burner fires, car fires and bouse fires.
