France Bogged By Continuing Strike Waves (Continued from Page One) members in the postal and tale phone service to continue their strike and decided to prolong the walkout of bus and subway work-ers another 24 hours. No decisions were announced concerning the federation's continuing strike on

The two non-Communist union - the Bocialist Workers Force (FO) and the Christian (Catholic) Workers Federation (CFTC) -have ordered members employed in the postal telephone and tele-graph services to return to their jobs but they apparently were not being generally obeyed. Letters still were not being delivered and the telephone service was still paralyzed. It had been ex-pected that the return of the two unions would restore near-normal service since they control the bulk of the postal, telephone and teleby government economy plans to trim public payrolls and lift the retirement age of persons in state-run services. Many strikers have added wage boosts to their lists of demands.


