## OUR FELLOW CIIIZENS OF MANCHESTER

This Monday our employes are again being asked to vote on whether they ant to be represented by an outside interest group. The union has made our omployes extravagant and irresponsible promises of things to come, even though they know they can't deliver on these promises.
We, at Manchester Modes, have now enjoyed 16 years of uninterrupted harmony with our amployes. We have employed as many people from this parable to like industries in our area. We have installed benefits scomparable o other industries in our area and superior to what the union now offers. We have provided more hours of work for our employes than the average union shop based on the monthly figures of the United States Department of Labor. Above all we have always had a close and honest relationship with all our employes. We appreciate what they have accomplished for us over heir long years of employment. Could it possibly be otherwise when over $50 \%$ of our amployes have been with us longer than five years?
We, of both labor and management, have been active, participating and contributing members of this community for many years. We have built ou cmoses, joined churches, poid our raxes and rransaciod our busiess in Mar ported all worthy drives and have been active in all civic activities

This election will be regulated by the National Labor Relations Board. Their notice of the election provides that workers actively employed during the payroll period onding September 26, 1953, are eligible to vote. We hope that all omployes appearing on our payroll os of that date will vote. We wan his election to be an expression of their withes.
We have tried to tell our employes, without bias, the facts involved in Monday's election for their enlightenment and guidance. We feel it is ou the community-labor-management harmony that has existed in this commun try for many years, and that these interests will best be sierved by a rejection of an out-of-state union.
