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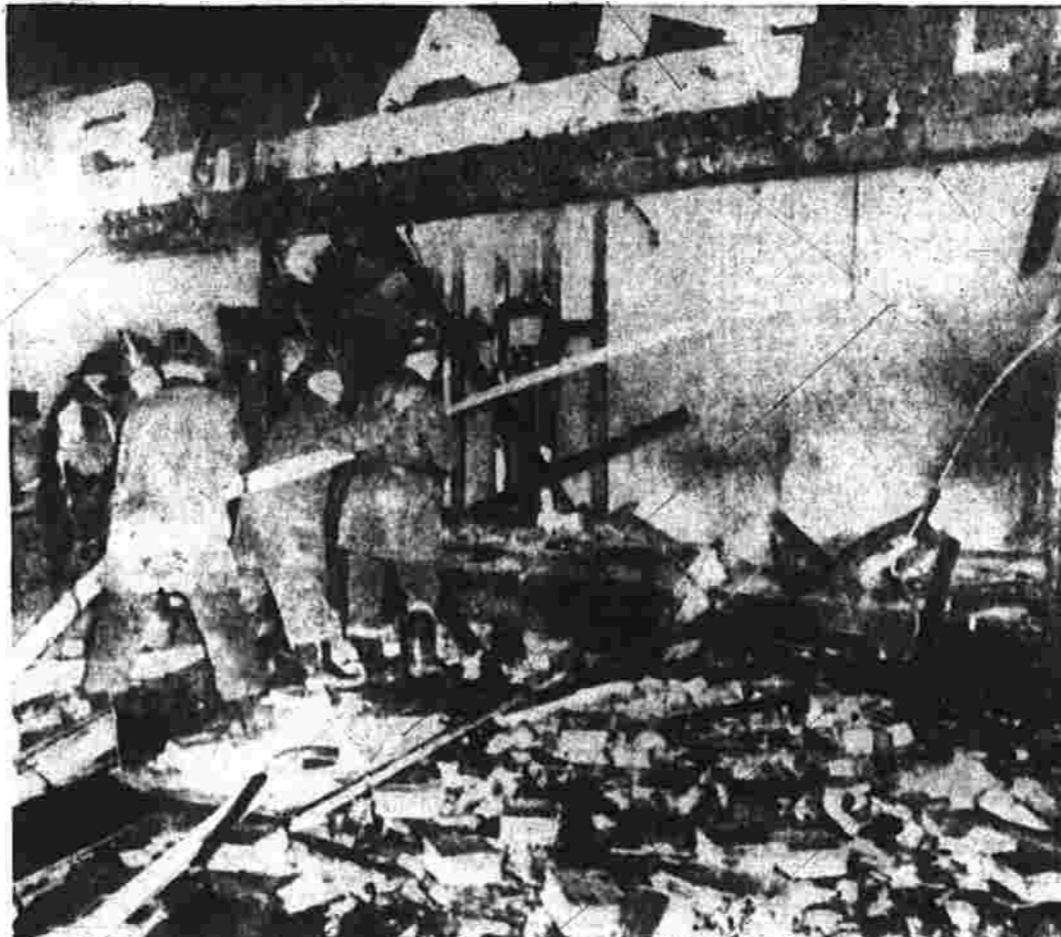

Gromyko said the Soviet Union considers itself free to end the suspension if the other powers did not join in. He did not indicate how long the Soviet Union would wait.

"We realize that ending of tests does not avert the danger of war," Gromyko told 1,575 intent deputies.

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Urges Soviet Agree To Supervision Plan

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The United States, the statement said, "stands ready instantly to respond" to a supervised suspension of nuclear tests, as approved overwhelmingly by the U.N. General Assembly.

The State Department fired back at the Soviet announcement, within minutes after Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko made it in Moscow.

The American comment had been carefully prepared for days, and approved in advance by President Eisenhower in anticipation that the Kremlin would spring such a maneuver, mainly to embarrass the United States just before it begins a big series of atomic-hydrogen tests in the Pacific.

The United States announced months ago that it would conduct a series of tests beginning this spring. The Soviet government has just completed a test series.

The first American shot will automatically free the Soviet Union from its test ban promise since Gromyko said that if other nations continued their tests his country would consider itself "free to resume tests."

Against this background, the impression was strong in diplomatic quarters here that the Soviet gesture was designed for its propaganda value.

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Chairman Durham (D-N.C.) of the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee said the Soviet announcement is "phony, like everything else they have done in that line."

Durham said the Soviets, in 14 tests since last August, apparently have tried out all the new types of weapons they have ready for explosion, and would be ready for a halt anyway.

Rep. Van Zandt (R-Pa.) said "this is as phony as it can be and is merely an attempt to embarrass us."

Van Zandt, a member of the committee on atomic energy said it would take the Soviets a year to evaluate the information gained in their just completed series of tests.

1. Russia could cheat without the world knowing as long as the Kremlin refused to allow United Nations inspectors to police any ban.
2. Russia has blocked work of the U.N. Disarmament Commission since last fall. The Soviets have refused to attend any meetings of this group, contending its membership is stacked in favor of western countries.
3. The quick State Department response to today's Moscow announcement said:

Western Note Gives Russians Summit Terms

Moscow, March 31 (AP)—The United States, Britain and France tonight handed to the Soviet government a note agreeing to participate in a summit conference under certain conditions.

U.S. Minister Richard Davis drove to the Soviet Foreign Ministry to deliver the communication to a Soviet deputy foreign minister.

It was understood that British and French diplomats went to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs at about the same hour to deliver their copies of the note.

The new western note reaffirmed the view of the United States that any summit conference must be preceded by adequate preparation and have some chances of success on at least some points.

The note was unanimously approved by all 15 nations of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Western thinking was that the summit conference might be held this fall some diplomats felt.

The text of the note was released in London, Washington and Paris later today, informants said. The note was not specifically in reply to any of the summit messages.

Eisenhower Vetoes Farm Price Freeze

Washington, March 31 (AP)—President Eisenhower today vetoed the farm price support freeze bill, calling it "ill advised from the standpoint both of the nation and of our farm families."

In a veto message to Congress, the President said:

"With regard to government controls, what the farm economy needs is a thaw rather than a freeze."

Eisenhower's election year action on the measure came despite appeals from a good many Republicans in Congress that he sign the controversial bill.

In announcing his veto, Eisenhower said a 3-point program should be undertaken to deal with farm problems. Some sections of that program, embodied in the President's agriculture message to Congress in January, call for legislation:

1. "Ample authority already exists for others," Eisenhower said.
2. "It takes a two-thirds majority of members voting in both the Senate and the House to override a presidential veto."
3. "The measure passed both the House and Senate by sizable majorities, but the margins were far short of the two-thirds required to override."

Eisenhower said he had given the bill his own study, and that he is his judgment that to approve the measure "would be ill advised from the standpoint of both the nation and our farm families as well."

The bill freezes farm price supports at no less than 1957 levels for one year.

The President said approval of the bill would have such consequences as these:

1. It would pile up more farm products in government warehouses.
2. It would restrict the growth of markets.
3. It would postpone the day when agriculture can be released from the straitjacket of congressional approval.
4. It would bypass the problems of the small operator who produces so little for sale that price supports have scant meaning.
5. It would hold up the needed transition to modern parity and

35 Cubans Still Refusing Food, 5 Hospitalized

Brownsville, Tex., March 31 (AP)—Five of the 35 hunger striking Cuban rebel sympathizers were in a hospital today suffering from the effects of four days without food. The other 30 again refused breakfast in the Cameron County Jail.

Three of the men were taken to Mercy Hospital last night and two others today after a physician examined them.

For the first time since being jailed, food was taken to the prisoners' cell block. Previously they were marched through the chow line as usual. An officer said none wanted to go through the line and some didn't feel like doing so.

The pair taken to the hospital early today are Silvio Martinez Gonzalez and Lorenzo Diaz Lopez, were seized aboard a small vessel off the lower Texas Gulf Coast early this spring. They have spent jail food since their arrest protesting U.S. intervention in the case.

They are charged with conspiring to violate the U.S. Neutrality Act. Held on the same charges are an individual named as their contact man and four Communist organizers of the boat.

Deputy U.S. Marshal E. E. Sadler said the three men were in

Sentences Upheld On Red Fugitives

Washington, March 31 (AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld 34 3-year contempt sentences of Communist leaders Gilbert Green and Henry Winston.

The two were fugitives for almost five years after the Supreme Court in 1951 affirmed their convictions for conspiring to teach and advise violent overthrow of the government. The contempt sentences, given them in U.S. District Court in New York, stemmed from their flight.

Justice Harlan delivered the majority decision for himself and Justices Frankfurter, Burton, Clark and Whittaker. Justice Black wrote a dissenting opinion in which he was joined by Chief Justice Warren and Justice Douglas. Justice Brennan also wrote a dissenting opinion and Warren joined in it.

The contempt sentences were in addition to 3-year prison sentences Green and Winston drew on the original conspiracy conviction.

Green was Illinois chairman of the Communist party and Winston was party organization secretary. They were among 11 top Communist leaders convicted in 1948 of violating the Smith Act.

Green and Winston contended in their appeal that use of the contempt power to punish fugitives for absconding was without precedent in Anglo-American law. They also questioned whether criminal contempt could be punished by a sentence of more than one year's imprisonment.

Harlan's opinion cited the history of contempt judgments in similar cases and said:

"As the present cases evidence the issuance of a bench warrant and the forfeiture of bail following the flight of the fugitives, there are no reasons of policy suggesting a need for limitation of the contempt power in this situation."

GOP, Democrats List Anti-Recession Action

Washington, March 31 (AP)—The joint statement noting 29 anti-recession steps the Eisenhower administration has taken by itself and 21 more it has asked Congress to approve.

Knowland and Martin said stepped-up spending actions in volume more than \$9 billion and that as these actions "make themselves felt across the nation, the dollar impact of the impetus will be immeasurable."

They said there is "no leaf raking make-work in the administration program," adding that the actions are designed to create meaningful activity soon.

The Democrats' Digest, in its April issue, released yesterday, spoke of what it called "the strange spectacle of administration leaders and Republican congressional members saying 'me too' to the Democratic anti-recession programs."

The Digest, official publication of the Democratic National Committee, said Congress has been "submerged in Democratic proposals to ensure full employment, to neutralize the long harmful effects of the administration's tight money policies, and to put the full potential of the American economy back to work on badly needed public works projects."

The Democratic article was prepared before the Knowland-Martin statement came out, but it obviously was designed to reply to previous GOP claims of leadership in the fight against the business slump and unemployment.

Israeli, Syrian Tanks, Mortars In New Battle

Jerusalem, March 31 (AP)—Israeli and Syrian battled with tanks and mortars on the Syrian border again today, an Israeli Army spokesman said.

The spokesman charged that Syrians opened fire with 120 mm. mortars and tanks at Israeli workers in the disputed Hulah region that has been the scene of a bitter struggle since the 1948-49 Arab-Israeli war.

This was the second clash in two days. The two sides fought a 75-minute tank and mortar battle in the same area yesterday. During the past week there have been sporadic small arms skirmishes.

The Israeli spokesman said there were no casualties on the Israeli side so far.

The new outbreak came as Israel's army chief, Maj. Gen. Haim Laskov, toured the area with high staff officers.

It quoted the spokesman as saying: "Eisenhower's republic will defend the lives of its subjects, their land and property."

Earlier the UAR accused Israel of aggression in yesterday's clash and the Israelis issued countercharges.

The Arabs oppose any work on the reclamation project at Hulah because they fear it means the Israelis are softening their hold on the sector claimed by Syria.

An Arab Army spokesman in Damascus warned that "it is high time for Israel to realize that the UAR army of Egypt and Syria will defend the lives of UAR citizens and their lands against any aggression aimed at murder and usurpation."

Senate Unit Backs Pension Controls

Washington, March 31 (AP)—The Senate Labor Committee today approved a bill to regulate labor pension and welfare plans and fix federal criminal penalties for those who misuse such funds.

Sponsors estimate it would cover about 40,000 plans and at least two million covered employees.

Plans covering fewer than 100 employees and government-sponsored plans are exempt. However, the bill does bring in plans exclusively run by management as well as those which result from bargaining with unions.

Teamsters Back Strike To Win Contract Terms

Boston, March 31 (AP)—Teamsters Union locals in Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut have voted to authorize a strike if agreement is not reached on a new contract.

The old contract which expires April 11 covers 13,000 drivers, helpers and other trucking industry employees.

A union official disclosed last night that the balloting at the local level was predominantly in favor of a walkout.

Nicholas P. Morrissey, New England regional organizer, said the union is asking \$2.60 an hour for drivers whose current rate is \$2.17, and \$2.57 for helpers instead of the current \$2.07 hourly.

Details of the proposals are not disclosed.

The union said Boston's big local 25 voted 2,887 to 86 in favor of a strike. Worcester local 170 backed the strike proposal with a

531-128 vote and Fall River authorized a strike, 40-9.

Other locals which voted to strike, the union said, were Providence Local 251, Springfield Local 404, and four in Connecticut—Local 443 in New Haven, Local 451 in Hartford, Norwich Local 493 and Bridgeport Local 191.

Waterbury, Conn., Local 677, also met over the weekend, but its action was not disclosed.

The union spokesman said management seeks to eliminate a clause calling for overtime pay after eight hours in any one day. He said the companies want to continue the overtime pay only after 40 hours in any week.

Management officials could not be reached for comment.

An unidentified Rhode Island trucking company head said the union also seeks to end "piggybacking"—shipping loaded truck trailers by rail.

The Teamsters have been opposed to "piggybacking" trucking practices for some time on the grounds it takes jobs from the truck drivers.

New Haven Railroad spokesman says railroads can provide fast delivery on long hauls cheaper than if the trailer trucks were driven over the highways.

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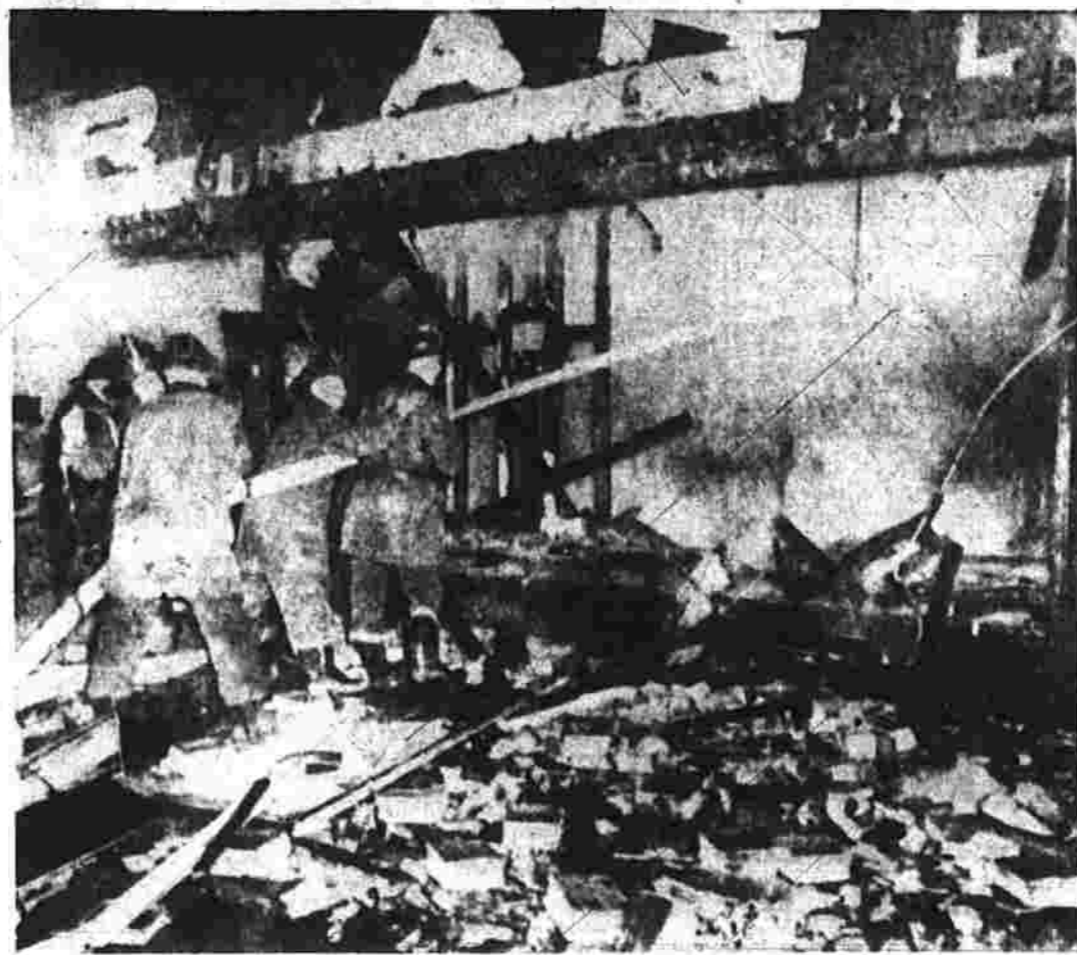

"As the present cases evidence the issuance of a bench warrant and the forfeiture of bail following the arrest of the fugitives, there are no reasons of policy suggesting a need for limitation of the contempt power in this situation."

Washington, March 31 (AP)—The joint statement noting 29 anti-recession steps the Eisenhower administration has taken by itself and 21 more it has asked Congress to approve.

Knowland and Martin said stepped-up spending actions in volume more than \$9 billion and that as these actions "make themselves felt across the nation, the dollar impact of the impetus will be immeasurable."

They said there is "no leaf raking make-work in the administration program," adding that the actions are designed to create meaningful activity soon.

The Democratic article was prepared before the Knowland-Martin statement came out, but it obviously was designed to reply to previous GOP claims of leadership in the fight against the business slump and unemployment.

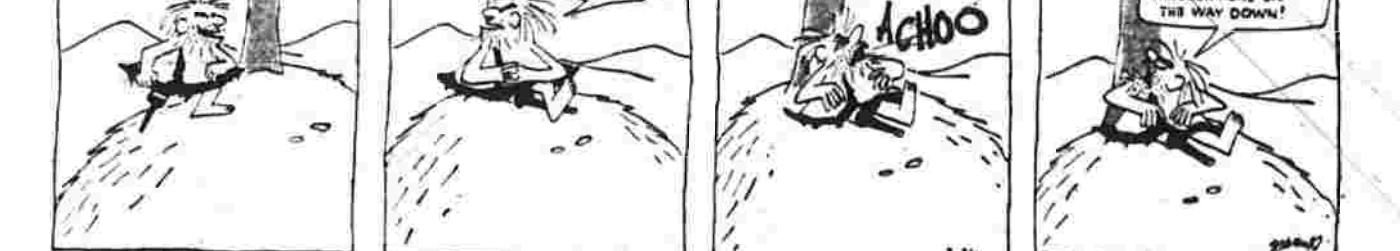
