Mine Search Ship Is Non-Magnetic Boston - The Bittern, now on Atlantic Coast patrol, is the Unite States Navy's first non-magnetic mine hunter. The ship is made of laminated red-oak timbers because the white oak normally used for shipbuilding is in short supply. Since red oak is not seaworthy. the Bittern's timbers were protect-ed against rot by being impreg-nated under pressure with a spe-cially developed chemical com-pound. A copper-bearing chemical protects her lower hull against marine borers. The Bitern, considered especiall sturdy, is felt to be represents of a new shipbuilding era.
